



The Democratic campaign up to this time has been mainly one of slander upon your fair fame. I congratulate you upon the result in Ohio. The large majority given to the Republican ticket in your native State is a complete and unanswerable refutation of their calumnies.

THE SITUATION EAST NIGHT.

All but Eight Counties Heard From, and the Republicans Gain 4,418. COLUMBUS, O., October 13.—Very little interest has been manifested here to-day over the election news, the interest centering almost entirely on the returns from Indiana. At the Republican headquarters special telegrams have been received from the chairmen of the committees in all but eight counties of Ohio, showing the complete returns on Secretary of State and Supreme Judge. According to the returns from these eighty counties, on the vote for Secretary of State the Republican gains are 7,005, and the Democratic gains 5,657. The net Republican gain over Foster's plurality of 17,129 last year is 2,248. The net Republican gain on Supreme Judge is 4,418.

Partial returns from Ross and Lucas show considerable Republican gains.

Partial returns from Ross and Lucas show considerable Republican gains. The Republican Committee concludes from the above figures that Townsend's majority for Secretary of State will be close to 20,000, and that McMillan's plurality for Supreme Judge will be near 22,000. No figures have been received showing the majorities given for Congressmen, but enough is known to make the committee feel sure that the Republicans have elected 15 out of the 20 Congressmen.

At the Democratic headquarters there are returns from seventy counties, and these the Democratic Committee claim show a net Democratic gain of 1,573 on Secretary of State over Foster's vote. They say that the same ratio will show a net gain in the State of 2,002. This committee concedes the election of fifteen Republican Congressmen. These figures are all that can be obtained to-night.

REJOICING AT STEUBENVILLE.

Big Torchlight Procession—The Democrats Naturally Feel Blue. STEUBENVILLE, O., October 13. Special to the Intelligencer. The Republicans of this city have a large torchlight procession to-night over the Republican victories of yesterday. All the clubs in the city are out, and the line of march is crowded with lookers-on. Short speeches were made in the wigwag by prominent citizens and attorneys. The Democrats are feeling very blue and give up all hope.

THE MURDER BY URS.

OURAY, COLO., October 13.—The excitement is unabated over the fate of Jackson, who was captured by the Utes at Kline's Ranch. The Fourth Cavalry were halted at Sagschene on its way to Fort Garland by an order from General Pope and Colonel Beaumont, commanding, and directed to return to the agency to ascertain the facts in regard to the affair. The papers issued by the United States Commissioner, at Gunnison City for the arrest of the parties implicated, and the officers, arrived here last night. Ute, Lake City, and in daylight this morning accompanied by the Sheriff of Ouray county and others. Arriving at the Agency Agent Barry was placed under arrest, but Holmes and Hersey, who were arrested to accompany the prisoners will be taken to Gunnison City for examination.

A Large amount of freight is accumulating at Alamosa and South Arkansas, Ouray and intermediate points, which the freighters refuse to load at double the usual rates, as most of it is provision for winter and there is danger of a scarcity before spring unless steps are taken to protect the freighters.

FROM THE ARCTIC REGION.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 13.—The U. S. Revenue cutter, Thomas Corwin, returned from an Arctic cruise this morning, nine days from Unalakleet. She brings no intelligence in addition to that already received. She brings the news that at St. Lawrence Island out of 700 inhabitants 500 were found dead of starvation. The traders had introduced liquor among them causing them to neglect laying up the usual supply of provisions. The officers of the Corwin express their opinion that the Fenianists wintered on the Siberian shore and is now near west of North Cape. The Corwin could not get far enough west to verify this belief on account of ice.

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VICTORY!

How it Proved Useful in a New York Public School.

NEW YORK, October 13.—The presence of mind of Miss Purroy, Principal of Grammar School No. 58, undoubtedly averted what might otherwise have proved to be a disaster attended by loss of life. It has been the custom to light a gas stove in a small room on the floor every day shortly before noon for the purpose of making tea for the teachers. This was done yesterday, and in a few moments one of the scholars whispered to Miss Purroy that the small room was full of fire and smoke. The Principal at once went and closed its door, and then summoned the janitor of the building, to whom she made known the fact. The janitor went to the room, and Miss Purroy formed the pupils in procession, and marched them to the sidewalk before they had even a suspicion of the cause of the unusual movement. The fire was extinguished before much damage was done. It has been the custom in this school to give the children the fire drill once a week, and yesterday's delivery proved its value.

The Presidential Party.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 13.—A Port Townsend dispatch says the President and party to-day left Seattle and visited Port Blakely and Port Gamble, where they were enthusiastically received, thence they proceeded to Port Townsend. About four miles from the Port a steamboat came alongside with the Committee of Reception on board the boat, and landed at about 11 o'clock. A salute was fired from the battery, and fully 1,500 people were assembled on the docks, and as the steamer came along repeated cheers were given for the President, Secretary Ramsey, Gen. Sherman and Gen. Howard. The party were driven at once upon arrival to a hotel, where, after an address of welcome, brief responses were made by the President, Secretary Ramsey and Gen. Sherman.

Another Arctic Expedition.

LONDON, October 13.—At a meeting of a council of the Royal Geographical Society, Lord Abroad presiding, a deputation of the Arctic Committee attended to ask the support of Commander Chesney's scheme for an Arctic expedition. Commander Chesney said it was due to England to take the lead in an Arctic exploration. He dwelt upon the steps which Americans were taking, expressing himself as content with a share in an American expedition now being sent out. Lord Abroad promised that if a written statement in regard to the details of the expedition was laid before the council the statement would be submitted to a competent body.

A Link With the Past Broken.

EAST LIVERPOOL, O., October 13.—George McKinnon, living about two miles east of this city, and one of the oldest settlers of this county, died Monday night of erysipelas, his limbs swelling till they burst. Mr. McKinnon was 85 years old, having a head when he was 17 years, and when the ground now occupied by the flourishing town of East Liverpool was a sugar camp and a hunting ground for the Indians.

Church Council.

MILWAUKEE, October 13.—The Norwegian Lutheran Synod of the United States began its annual session at LaCrosse to-day to continue through the week. Over one hundred and fifty ministers are in attendance from all parts of the United States.

Hotter Than We Thought.

INDIANAPOLIS, October 13.—A fire at Shelbyville, Indiana, this afternoon destroyed Stewart's planing mill, three or four business houses and twelve dwellings. Fire engines were sent from this city and stopped the progress of the fire.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The Secretary of the Treasury accepted today a half million bonds for sinking fund. Ex-United States senator Peleg Sragud died yesterday morning at Boston. A Seattle, Cal., dispatch says that the President and party, during yesterday afternoon, visited the coal mines, and in the evening held a public reception.

BRIEFS BY CABLE.

The Emperor of Russia is indisposed. The Turks are preparing to surrender Delicigno but some resistance from the Albanians is expected. At a meeting of the Land League Dillon, Sexton and Sullivan strongly protested against the postal letter of Archbishop McCabe, of Dublin. A strong force of Basutos attacked Masaru, South Africa, Sunday last. The firing continued throughout the day and night. The Basutos were ultimately repulsed. The loss on the Colonial side was trifling. It is roughly estimated that the Bank of France within the last three or four days has parted with about two million pounds of gold. This supply may be found available for export to the United States on the English or German account. Of gold sent into the Bank of England yesterday, the sum of £203,000 was French coin, ultimately destined to the United States.

THE ST. PETERSBURG NEWS.

The St. Petersburg News, newspaper, published a telegram from the Municipality of Novo Tchekawk, which states that the merchants there have an insufficient supply of cereals for consumption. The population have petitioned the Minister of the Interior to prohibit the export of grain from the Sea of Azof. Gen. L. A. Melnikoff, Chief Executive of the Government, visited the St. Petersburg Corn Exchange for the purpose of inquiring the price, and the amount and report of wheat. It is stated he contemplates stopping the exportation of cereals to foreign countries. Large quantities of American maize and Chilean wheat are being sold at St. Petersburg. Flour is being imported by the way of Statten.

INDIANAPOLIS, October 13.—Returns from 500 voting places gives a Democratic vote of 105,990; Republican, 110,881; National, 5,478. The same places in 1876 gave the Democrats 100,885; Republicans, 105,768; National, 6,089, net Republican gain, 6,018. The Democratic majority for Governor in 1876 was 5,139. The above is forty-eight per cent of the vote of the State. If the balance of the State to hear from gives the same vote of gains Porter's majority will be 6,131.
