THE INSURANCE CASES.

Argument of Attorney General White fo The Agents Yesterday. According to previous arrangement the agents of foreign insurance companies in this city together with their counsel aptaken from a partial list prepared by As- peared before Police Justice Cranmer ye terday morning at 10 o'clock in the Muni Barbour-Lewis Wilson, R. Attorney General Robert White, of the counsel for the agents, opened the arguments and spoke the entire day. We give the points upon which he based his mo tion to quash the processes:

First.—That the summons should be quashed from errors apparent upon its face, in that it does not name any plaintiff; it does not substantially plead the ordinance under which it purports to be issued, and does not charge any legal offense excitatt the narties. and does not charge any legal offense against the parties.
Second.—It is claimed that the City Council can pass no ordinance unleasclearly authorized to do so by legislative action, and further that any ordinance passed must strictly conform to acts of the Legislature, and insist that the ordinance in question does not conform to the act of Legislature.

tion does not conform to the act of Legislature.

The Legislative act authorizes the council to assess and collect the license on each agency, of any foreign insurance company doing business in this city. The ordinance is not consistent with the act of Legislature, First, because it seeks to punish any individual who may transact business as an insurance agent of a foreign company, or any person who may solicit risks for a foreign company, or who may establish an insurance agency in the city. It does not therefore seek to assess a tax upon each agency, but seeks to punish an individual who may happen to be an agent. Again the ordinance is inconsistent with the act of Legislature, because the act of Legislature authorizes.

an agent. Again the ordinance is inconsistent with the act of Legislature, because the act of Legislature authorizes Council alone to assess a liceuse upon each agency. Whereas the ordinance seeks to make the business unlawful, unless a liceuse is first obtained from the Clerk of the city. Again, the ordinance is inconsistent with the act of the Legislature, because the act authorizes the Council to assess and collect the liceuse on such agency of a foreign company doing business in the city. The ordinance seeks to make that business unlawful unless the liceuse is first obtained and paid for. Again, even if the ordinance is not inconsistent with the act of the Legislature then the liceuse tax, if meant to be a lax for revenue, amounts more than to a single tax, because it is so great as to operate as a prohibition to the business. If meant to be a liceuse for the regulation of the insurance business in the city, then

If meant to be a license for the regulation of the insurance business in the city, then the tax being \$50 for each company represented is illegal, for in such a case the license cannot be required of a greater amount than is sufficient to reimburse the city for all costs and damages sustained by it or its people or expenses incurred in providing such regulation resulting therefrom.

It is also insisted that, inasmuch as the It is also insisted that, inasmuch as the foreign companies have complied with the State law in paying taxes, &c., in January, 1879, and were granted the privilege of doing business in the State, that the Legislature could not interfere with their so doing business by afterwards, during that year, authorizing the imposition of additional burdens by imposing taxation during that year.

MONTENEGRIN MATTERS.

BUDA PESTH, October 27 .- At the sitting of the Austrian delegation the Committee on Foreign Affairs, Baron Von Haymerle, President of the Imperial Ministry, in replying to several questions said that for the Montenegrin question there could be but one programme, namely, the execu-

but one programme, namely, the execution of the Berlin treaty. That the intention of the Porte to cede Dulcigno was beyond all doubt and that the present hitch in negotiations is connected with purely military details. The Austrian Government, he said, felt bound to exercise its full diplomatic influence in favor of Greece. The principal aim of the powers was to confer with one another on each individual incident and to conciliate their respective views.

There could be no doubt that Austria and other powers still intend to maintain the Ottoman Empire. There was every reason to hope that the commercial treaty with Germany would be satisfactorily concluded. Baron Von Haymerle asserted positively that Austria and Germany had acted in close concert in every single incident in relation to the Eastern question, more especially in regard to the naval demonstration.
