Ohio County's Quota to the River Railroad Survey.

The Board of Commissioners of this county meet to-day, and to this meeting will be presented a petition, numerous and influential, signed, asking the Board to appropriate \$3,000 to the survey of the Wheeling, Parkersburg & Charleston Railroad. This amount is the quota assigned to Ohio county as her share of the \$10,000 necessary to be raised along the route for the survey. Parkersburg has already raised her quota, and so has Wetzel county, and the news from Jackson shows that she is moving enthusiastically in the work assigned to her.

Ohio county has been pledged for her quota, and as an appropriation by the board for \$3,000 is the fair and impartial way to raise it, we trust that the honorable members will see their way to act promptly on the petition presented to them to-day. It is very desirable to put the money in the hands of the distributing agents at once, and have the survey begun not later than the first of May, so that the road can be put under contract at the earliest possible day. The eastern syndicate is represented by Mr. Camden as desirous of building the road this year. They are able to place the bonds at this time. They may not be able to place them three months hence. Any unforeseen event that would disturb the present ease in the money market might change the whole complexion of things, and put this road off to an indefinite time in the future. Now is the golden opportunity which we must improve. Hence the expediency of moving promptly in the matter.

What the Baltimore & Ohio Might Do in the Way of Securing a Right-of-Way.

There is a narrow gauge railroad from Temperanceville, a suburb of Pittsburgh, to Washington, Pa. It is about thirty miles in length, and a very one horse affair. It is called the Pittsburgh Southern Railroad, and there is a movement on foot to extend it through West Virginia to some point on the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad. At present it has no value to its stock or bondholders, inasmuch as it is poorly built, poorly equipped and poorly run.

The Baltimore & Ohio Company has fiddled for years in regard to a railroad connection west from Pittsburgh, and at one time was offered the Ft. Wayne road and at another the Cleveland & Pittsburgh, and still later the proposed new line recently gobbled up by other parties; but with that strange lack of administrative capacity which has characterized its general policy it has never accomplished anything. And yet it was always and is now a very important matter for that company to secure a connection westward from Pittsburgh.

It seems to us that the most feasible remnant of opportunity left for the Baltimore & Ohio is this Pittsburgh Southern road. It could be used as a connection with the Hempfield, and the distance could be shortened at least five miles by a connection east of Washington. Thus tacked on to the Hempfield it would give the Baltimore & Ohio a line from the West to Pittsburgh, and from Pittsburgh to the West.

Of course the grade would have to be changed and the grades greatly improved, and an entrance into Pittsburgh proper effected, all of which could be accomplished, and when accomplished the Baltimore & Ohio would have a very fair line from that important centre to and from the West.

The adoption of such a policy would not necessarily mean the abandonment of the project for extending the Pittsburgh Southern through West Virginia to the Chesapeake and Ohio road. The road could be carried South just as fast as the people along the proposed route are willing to subscribe for that purpose. Any extension southward would increase its business, and would be a feeder also to the Baltimore and Ohio main stem.

Of course the principal point to view in the purchase of the road would be to use it as a connecting link with Pittsburgh. The company would thereby secure a road to Wheeling of sixty miles in length, and an outlet to Chicago for all the carrying trade of Pittsburgh. This would give Pittsburgh a rival line, and give the Baltimore and Ohio a valuable business.

We do not suppose that the Baltimore & Ohio will improve this opportunity. It never does improve such opportunities. The traditions of the company are all against such a manifestation of energy and enterprise. The miscarriage of all their eleventh hour demonstrations between Baltimore and New York, as well as at Pittsburgh, illustrate how for the sake of pennies they have always sacrificed dollars.

Their management of the Hempfield extension is a fair illustration of this penny wise and pound foolish policy. Had they built the Hempfield to the coke field years ago it would have paid for itself a hundred fold by this time. There is absolutely no limit to the coke trade, and yet the B. & O. with one of the best of possible lines to that field, have allowed the trade in all these years to slip through their fingers and filter through Pittsburgh, to the enrichment of every body but themselves. In this they have greatly erred and grievously have they answered it.

We are well aware that the company have at this time important enterprises on hand—for instance, their new Philadelphia line, but they ought not for that to neglect an opportunity that promises them for no small amount of money such important results as would follow the incorporation of the Pittsburgh Southern into their system.
