THE SILVER JUBILEE OF "MONSIGNORE" J. T. SULLIVAN. Year General of This Diocese, Celebrated with Appropriate and Impressive Ceremonies.

It is rarely indeed that such an event as celebrated at the Catholic Cathedral in this city yesterday occurs in that church, and it is not surprising that the twenty-fifth anniversary of the ordination of a priest should be made the occasion of such general and notable rejoicing by his flock and his brother clergymen.

YESTERDAY'S SERVICES. The celebration of the anniversary was ushered in with high mass in the cathedral yesterday forenoon at 10 o'clock; Father Sullivan acting as celebrant, with the following assistants: Deacon, Father O'Connor, Clarkburg; sub-deacon, Father McBurney; Bishop Kain, mitre and crozier, and Father Sullivan, vestments of the famous St. Sulpice, of Paris.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS. This principle, said the Bishop, rests upon justice as well as gratitude. We honor those who have rendered us services and the value of such services is a great factor in our estimation of them. We honor those who favor us and advance our interests. To-day we meet here, my pastor, and your people, to give thanks for the services of a man who has been invaluable to us as a people for the last twenty years.

THE PASTOR'S ADDRESS. For ten days or so past Father Sullivan has been receiving congratulatory letters and dispatches from his school mates of a quarter of a century ago, from the professors of the two schools in which he studied, from the Superior of the Sulphur order in the United States, and other distinguished clergymen.
