PERSONAL. Somebody held up the Indiana Democratic editors at their convention the other day and ascertained that thirty of them in the State are for McDonald for President, while all are strongly opposed to the "old ticket."

PERSONAL. Cucumbers, according to M. Delos, editor of the New York Herald, should be peeled and put to soak in ice-salt water at least an hour before served.

PERSONAL. Oblivious notice from the Kansas City Journal: "Nine-footed man," a personage well known in the circles of Hell's Half Acre society, fell into the Missouri river last evening and was drowned.

PERSONAL. A young man of Macon, Ga., while camping out with a party of friends, was heard to exclaim in his sleep: "For Heaven's sake, stand aside! That picture will kill you!" It was afterwards ascertained that his sweetheart, at about the same time, narrowly escaped being killed by falling picture under which she was standing.

PERSONAL. The Italian Minister of War has just issued a discouraging report on the subject of malaria in Italy, with a statistical paper showing the position of the malarial districts and their relation to the disease.

PERSONAL. The high liquor license law of Illinois went into effect July 1, and though it is too early to judge of results the law seems to have the support of public opinion, the first step towards its success. Any city, town or village may prohibit the sale of liquor within its limits.

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PERSONAL. The Chicago Tribune says that this law, "taken in connection with previous legislation on the liquor question, renders the relations between the liquor dealers and the people of this State more equitable, satisfactory, and permanent than they are anywhere else, and as nearly perfect as any legislation can make the regulation of human frailties." The Tribune adds:

There is provision for prohibition in the only practicable way for enforcing it—local option—and also for the most desirable form of regulation where prohibition cannot be enforced. These conditions are in every way more favorable to public welfare than any other that we attempt to enforce throughout the State or any return to recognize the liquor traffic as legal.

The experience in Ohio is instructive. During more than thirty years the constitution of that State has forbidden the sale of liquor to authorize the issue of any license or permit for selling intoxicating liquor. During that time the most determined prohibitory movements have been made to abolish the saloons and to harass and punish the men who kept them. Fines and imprisonment, rigorous penalties, and every conceivable means have been employed by the zealots and fanatics to intimidate, suppress, or destroy the saloon-keepers, but all in vain. The number of saloons in the State grew to 14,000, as reported by the Internal Revenue Department of the General Government, and the policy of Ohio has been consistently disturbed by the agitation.

In Kansas the Constitution was shaped to prevent drinking by prohibiting the manufacture of the intoxicating liquor, and the result is that the Constitution is defied and liquor continues to be sold and drunk openly and without any tax, restraint, or regulation whatever in most of the cities and towns. And the political reaction was so great that the anti-liquor movement was defeated by a high license Democrat in a State that gives to the Republican majority.

In Iowa the same prohibitory effort has been made, notwithstanding the bitter failure of the Kansas prohibitory experiment, and there is a prospect, not only that it will meet with the same defeat as in Kansas, but that it will also overturn completely the political control of the State by the dominant party still persist in it. In these and all other States where the law undertakes to prohibit liquor, or where the liquor traffic is not recognized by the State, the saloon-keepers and their friends have been deprived of all revenue from the most profitable business transacted, of all indemnification against the heartless and expensive imposition upon the public by the liquor traffic, and of all opportunity for regulating and restricting that traffic.
