THREATENED IN THE OLD DOMINION.

Arthur's Chances Improved for the Republican Nomination, Says the "Star."

President Arthur's friends are said to be particularly hopeful over the result in New York, and some of them go so far as to claim that it makes Arthur's nomination a necessity.

GRATEFUL FOR DEFEAT.

A Democratic Leader on Benjamin F. Butler's Rout.

WASHINGTON, November 9.—The relief which the Democrats feel over the defeat of Butler is well shown by the leader of the Washington Post on his failure, entitled "Butler's Losses."

An unprecedently large vote was thrown in Massachusetts Tuesday, and the general feeling is that Gov. Butler shall not hold the position which he now occupies after January next. The result was hardly unexpected, though there had been such a langling of old party lines that predictions were generally made that the election would be a close one.

It cannot be said that the result was a surprise. He has assumed the part of an absolutist with respect to the election, and his assumption has not been challenged. Butler has been commander-in-chief and supreme executive magistrate in his own behalf from the time he was inaugurated Governor till his defeat Tuesday.

The votes have been counted, and the claim is proved to be a mere pretense. We have no quarrel with the Democrats who for so long a time supported Butler. They believed in his ability and in the temperance of his administration. They had endured much from the Republican party, and the opportunity to get even with it was too tempting to withstand.

Butler has led the Democrats of Massachusetts into trouble, but he cannot help them. He has done the main thing, and far-seeing enough, to help himself. They were never in the debt of this man. They have heaped honors upon him that he never will repay.

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This conduct on the part of the Lord Mayor and Mr. Stocker has produced a general sensation. It has caused indignation among the friends of Sir Moses Montefiore and Hebrews generally. Lord Mayor's Procession. LONDON, November 9.—The procession of the Lord Mayor's show passed off without disturbance. It was a mile long. On Corn Hill an elaborately decorated grand stand was erected, upon which the Lord Mayor received the address from the Common Council. The procession, especially troops exhibiting the commercial products of Canada, Australia and India, together with the exhibits of the International Fisheries Exhibition, including the Grace Darling boat, elicited great enthusiasm.
