

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FARM HOMES.

Some Suggestions Looking to Improve Men's Estly Made. The immediate surroundings of farmers' homes generally are far from being as attractive in appearance as they can easily be made. Indeed the rural front yards are, as a rule, much less beautiful and interesting than those of people in the same general circumstances in towns and cities.

There is no reason for this. The latter, laws are well cared for, and choice ornamental trees, shrubs and flowers are much oftener met with than about country homes. There is no reason for this. Such ornamental plants are not more easily acquired, but just the reverse. The farmer has teams, implements and manures for putting the house grounds in the best condition for ornamental treatment. That is quite as cheap as in town, while adding a lawn costs far less in the country. Trees and plants are as cheap to the farmer as to any one, while in many places some of the best kinds of ornamental can be had from the woods for the digging.

There may be points in which life on the farm lacks the attractions common to town life, but in charming home grounds the farmer is certainly to blame if the city dweller excels him. It is often wondered why country life has not shown sufficient growth to long for the city. If more attention were given to making their home surroundings more cheerful and attractive for the sons and others of the family, there would be less heard of their discontent. And in all such work every proper effort is sure to be seconded by the wife; while nothing is more natural than for the children to be enthusiastic helpers in this work.

Such improvements of course require some outlay, but this can hardly be proved otherwise than a good investment. Every dollar judiciously spent in this way will soon be returned many fold in the increased valuation of any place, should it be desirable to sell, to say nothing of the greater happiness and love of home that will thus be inspired.

Now that long evenings are at hand, this subject should receive due consideration. Plans may be drawn up for an improved arrangement of walks, drives, flower beds, shrubbery, borders, and other matters, and entered upon a map, long before winter is over, so that when spring opens the work can go on intelligently and to the best advantage.

POULTRY KEEPING. How to Begin and How to Make it Profitable. Begin with one sort, then—no matter what that sort is, so long as it suits the fancy—breed them in their purity, take good care of both old and young, and you will be likely at the end of the first year to know enough about raising poultry to try a second variety, if you choose, and when you are thoroughly interested you will be content with a single variety to look after. The great error with the majority is, they attempt at the outset to do too much. Again, the question of numbers is an important one, and depends largely upon the amount of space that can be devoted to their accommodations. Never have more than forty to fifty, at most, and under one under one building, unless it be a large one. They can not live and remain healthy if crowded together in great numbers. The evils from their bodies, gas, straggles, lice or vermin. Upon limited premises a dozen or twenty may be kept comfortably, but the day you crowd fifty to one hundred fowls or chicks into one house, you will find that they will begin to fall off in laying, the birds will get sick, vermin will congregate in myriads about their roosts, in their nests, and upon their bodies; then farewell to your poultry-keeping for profit. Too many in one house; don't attempt it. You will lose your time, your money, your fowls and your patience.

This is true. They must be kept in small lots on any place on the farm, big or little, and separated from any other community. In conclusion, we would urge all to get good, pure-bred stock. Begin with one sort at first, feed and water regularly and judiciously; house them warm in winter and cool in summer; keep them free from vermin, and there will be but little trouble in realizing a handsome profit from a few fowls.

Manufactures in the South. Memphis, Tennessee. An ounce of hard fact is worth several pounds of mere speculation. Southern manufacturing industries are protected by Federal laws the same as Northern manufactures are protected, but the people of South Carolina have the wisdom to see that they can't build up these industrial enterprises until they have still further protection and means to exempt manufacturers from all taxation in that State in order to encourage industrial growth. It is safe to say that other Southern States need this additional encouragement in order to more rapidly build up their waste places. Now, will any man of common sense entertain the opinion that the withdrawal of all protection will promote the growth of manufactures in the South?
