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RAILROAD GOSSIP. TALK OF SEVERAL PROJECTS. Of Local Importance, If They Materialize. The B. & O.'s Short Line via the Old Hempstead Road—The "Cannon Ball Route"—Matters Over the River.

The opening of spring seems to have had a reviving influence upon the several railroad projects in this vicinity which were talked of last fall, but have been rather held in abeyance through the long and severe winter. The agitation of the extension of the Ohio River road down the river to Point Pleasant was begun several weeks ago, and a spirit of enterprise appears to have been aroused in the people of the counties along the line from Parkersburg to the mouth of the Kanawha.

THE COMMITTEE ON SCALES has very little trouble in getting up its estimate. It ran over last year's expenses, found out that they amounted to about \$50,000, and decided to ask for \$1,000.

THE COMMITTEE ON MARKETS figured out that it would require at least \$3,000 to see it through to the first of next January and in addition decided to make a strong plea to Council and the Finance Committee for the privilege of erecting a respectable market building on the site of the old Centre Market place.
