A HOMICIDE ON TRIAL.

BOETTNER, WHO KILLED DICK, In the Second Ward Over a Year Ago, Arraigned in the Circuit Court to Answer to the Indictment for the Crime.

Yesterday in Part II of the Circuit Court before Judge Jacob, George H. Boettner was put on trial for the murder of Charles Dick, March 1, 1884, at William Mueller's saloon, on Market street, in the Second ward.

Prosecuting Attorney Jordan is assisted in the prosecution of the case by Col. W. W. Arnett, and the defense is in the hands of Capt. B. B. Dovenor.

Comparatively little difficulty was experienced in securing a jury, considering the gravity of the trial. The twelve jurors are Messrs. John R. Miller, Louis A. Nolte, W. D. Armstrong, H. F. Nolte, William Lohman, Lawrence Skelly, Henry Tressel, Henry Knoke, Thomas Barke, George Mathison, Sr., James Laton and Thomas Myer.

Boettner and Dick met in Mueller's saloon the first of March. Several parties were there. A game of cards was played, and Boettner accused Louis Cook of cheating him at poker.

Dick followed Boettner almost immediately, and those in the saloon heard a shot fired. They ran out and found Boettner lying on the pavement.

Boettner was taken to the hospital, but he died before he could be removed. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and Boettner was sentenced to the penitentiary for life.

THE defense set up a plea of justifiable homicide, alleging that Dick attacked Boettner in the saloon and struck him, and that he followed him out upon the street for the purpose of renewing the quarrel.

The death of Mueller removes one important witness, but there are still a number of witnesses who saw the difficulty before the shooting, and the shooting itself.

THE State yesterday examined Louis Cook, who had the first difficulty with Boettner, and who was described by Dick's death to the witness, which caused confusion of the brain; ex Chief of Police Bennett, who reached the saloon just before Dick died; Charles Elig and Louis Britt, who were eye-witnesses of the shooting.

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TO GET THE INSURANCE.

A Wood County Man Burns his Barn—He Confesses. On the night of April 19 last, a large barn on the farm of Nathan Hutchinson, of Wood county, about eleven miles from Parkersburg, was destroyed by fire.

The \$2,500 insurance had been taken out through Hunter Smith's agency, at Parkersburg. Last week an agent of the company was sent to adjust the loss.

He and Smith for some time had been questioning him but could not get the truth out of him. The next day a man by the name of Joseph P. Wiseman was produced, who made an affidavit stating that he was the owner of the barn.

He was taken to the penitentiary for a short time, but he was released on bail. He is now in the city, and is being questioned by the police.

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KILLED BY THE CARS.

A. S. & O. BRAKEMAN IS RUN OVER. He was killed by the cars on the street. He was a well known citizen.

John L. Mackey, A. S. & O. brakeman, met with an accident on the Hempfield division yesterday morning, and sustained injuries which resulted in his death about eight hours after the occurrence.

He was acting as brakeman on the first section of a through west-bound freight, and about 4 o'clock, when near Roney's Point, was run over by the cars.
