Now Mr. Carlisle submits to an interview which bears the earmarks of his own careful revision. Mr. Carlisle does not go so far as to set the President up for administration support in these words:

I am satisfied that Mr. Cleveland and the heads of the various departments are doing the very best they can under the circumstances, and that they are entitled to the confidence and support of their people throughout the country.

Furthermore, Mr. Carlisle without mentioning the Pennsylvania statesman, takes issue with him on the important question of tariff revision. He is not willing to wait for another census; he predicts that the next Congress will hold the tariff and revise it.

What Mr. Carlisle says, therefore, is of great interest at a time of wide-spread industrial depression, aggravated every day by the importation of foreign manufactures.
