A COMMUNICATION from the Dean of the Faculty of Jefferson Medical College goes to-day. It is a long and honorable institution of learning needed to be set straight in West Virginia the statement of Dr. Bartholow ought to do it.

There is at least one peculiar feature in the case which lies at the bottom of this affair. The State Board of Health permits a physician to practice before he attends the Jefferson College. When this physician comes home with a Jefferson diploma, the Board declares that this man ought not to have been graduated, and resolves that hereafter it will not recognize the diploma of the Jefferson Medical College.

If the diploma ought not to have been granted, certainly the physician in question ought not to have been permitted by the Board to practice within its jurisdiction. It is not well enough regarded in medicine to entitle him to a diploma he was not qualified to practice his profession. We are unable to see the strength of the Board's position, for it condemns a college for doing what it had already practically done itself.

MORRISON RESOLUTION Dissented in the Senate—The Views of the Various Senators.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—The Senate to-day considered the Morrison surplus resolution. Mr. Beck declared that the joint resolution so far from being a reflection on the Administration or any embarrassment to the Treasury Department was the very thing which a wise Administration would want, because it turned the responsibility upon Congress, whose agent the Secretary of the Treasury was.

Mr. McPherson commended the Republican party for its faithful guardianship of the public faith, and attacked the position of the Democratic majority in Congress upon the surplus question. He opposed the House resolution and said it was with many misgivings that he would vote for the Senate amendment.

Mr. Pium advocated the resolution as it came from the House. He believed a reserve of \$50,000,000 amply sufficient. Mr. Vest favored the joint resolution as it came from the House.

Mr. Sherman addressed the Senate in favor of the joint resolution as amended by the Committee on Finance. He considered it not as a political but as a business proposition. It undertook to regulate the redemption fund of the Treasury. Hitherto this had been left to the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury under certain limits defined by law.

Mr. Teller advocated the resolution as it came from the House.

Mr. Jones, of Nevada, made a long speech in which he laid down his theories as to political economy, and after speaking nearly two hours yielded for a secret meeting.

After agreeing to a conference on the Northern Pacific Land Forfeiture bill the Senate went into executive session and soon adjourned.

Powderly's Friends Charged. WILKINSON, Pa., July 29.—At a meeting of the Democratic Committee of Luzerne county, yesterday, it was resolved to recognize Mr. Stanley Woodward and to recommend him to all Democrats in Luzerne and Lackawanna counties for the nomination for Congress in the Twelfth Congressional District. Mr. Powderly's friends in Lackawanna county are much disgraced over the matter, as they had hoped that the Democrats of Luzerne county would support him as their candidate.

PROBABLY SETTLED.

THE DISTRICT ATTORNEYSHIP.

At a Late Hour Last Night It Looked as if General Watts Would Be the Successful Man—All of the Candidates Will Cheerfully Bow to any Decision.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—United States Attorney Flick's successor has not yet been named, notwithstanding the report last night that Chairman Leonard would be the successful applicant and that his name would be sent in to-day. The rumor that the Senators had agreed upon Leonard was denied to-day and to-night. Mr. Watts' name is above par. All parties concerned decline to be interviewed, but there seems to be an understanding that Senators Camden and Kenna will jointly recommend Mr. Watts to-morrow and that he will be the appointee. The best of feeling exists among the applicants, and so far the contest has been conducted in a most friendly spirit.

Mr. Leonard has stated to your correspondent that the matter has not yet been definitely decided, but that the appointment is likely to go to Mr. Watts. If Dalley secures the place it will be a great surprise to everybody, as it is admitted on all sides that the President will name whoever the Senators designate, and they unite in saying it will be upon either Leonard or Watts.

I am informed that the matter has been carefully canvassed by the Senators, and that they will make a recommendation that will not only be satisfactory to all parties immediately interested but will preserve harmony among the Democrats of the State.

All three of the candidates express themselves as being willing to abide by the decision of the two Senators. Your correspondent looks upon the fact that those who are in a position to know deduce the opinion that Watts will receive the appointment.

Mr. Leonard has made a gallant fight for his friend Dalley, but the two Senators will look upon the fact that the two Senators will be able to overreach him.

At a late hour to-night it was stated that the whole matter has been amicably arranged, but I am unable to state definitely who the lighting will be. The signal is that it is General Watts. The nomination will be sent to the Senate to-morrow or Saturday.

JEFFERSON MEDICAL COLLEGE

Of Philadelphia and the West Virginia State Board of Health.

To the Editor of the Intelligencer. Sir:—Several of the newspapers of Wheeling—your most esteemed journal amongst the number—have lately contained references to the Jefferson Medical College, of Philadelphia, that do injustice to one of the foremost medical institutions of this country. We are well-versed, however, that your sense of justice will permit us to be heard in our defense. That we have not done so earlier, is due to the fact that the publications of which we complain have only recently been brought to our notice.

In your news column, a paragraph appears under date of July 14th, from Charleston, W. Va., in which it is said that "the State Board of Health, had suspended the registration of graduates from Jefferson Medical College." This totally misrepresented the action of the Board. In a communication, which he did me the honor to address me, the president of the Board communicates the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the acceptance by any Medical College of a certificate given after an examination by this Board, in lieu of one of our lectures shall be considered as meeting the requirements of this Board."

As this resolution covers the technical question between the College and the Board, it is obvious that there can be no refusal to register the diplomas of Jefferson College, since the decision of the Board is in accordance with the action of the College in the single instance which has arisen or, indeed, can ever arise again.

In view of the erroneous statements, of which the various papers have been guilty, that have been published to our prejudice as a school of medical learning, permit me to make an explanation of the position of Jefferson College:

The case under consideration was that of a young physician of Wheeling, occupying an important public, professional position. He had obtained a medical education, and after passing an examination by the State Board of Health, was licensed to practice in the State of West Virginia.
