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THE BASHI BAZOOKS. ATTACK DEFENSELESS WOMEN. The Extreme to Which the Unholy Conspiracy of the Boycotters is Carried—A Vote to Cast in the Community Between Anarchy and Law.

On Saturday a committee of boycott Bashis Bazooks called on a defenseless workingwoman who has been a subscriber to the INTELLIGENCER and informed her that she must stop taking the paper or her employment would be taken away from her so far as lay in the power of these bulldozers and those who are in the conspiracy with them to take it away.
