That is the kind of a ticket that will have a chance to win.

Republican victory in the First Congressional District is a settled fact. It is only a question of Goff's majority. The table of majorities given below is compiled from official returns and estimates telegraphed from the several counties, and where they have not been received the majorities of 1884 are given as estimates. This figuring gives Goff 602 majority. His majority in 1884 was 202. The increase thus far reported makes it probable that his majority this year will swell the figures of the estimate published in this morning.

In the Second District Flick's election is confidently claimed, but official returns at this time are not sufficient to warrant the hope.

Returns for the Third and Fourth Districts are meager, but there can be no serious doubt of the election of the Democratic nominees.

It is impossible to give figures on the Legislature, though the chances are that the Democrats hold it by a majority on joint ballot not greatly different from that of the last.

Morgan town borough gives Flick a majority of two hundred and twenty-one.

THE KEYSTONE STATE.

Heaver Will Win by Over 30,000—Wolfe's Vote Very Light.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 2.—The Democratic State Committee concedes the election of Beaver. Chairman Cooper claims 12,000 plurality for Beaver in the State, and 23,000 in Philadelphia, making about 35,000 majority. News from five doubtful Congressional Districts is hopeful to Republican success in three. The Legislature is likely to have a Republican majority of 73 on joint ballot. Wolfe's vote was very light.

THE PRESS.

Congressmen Elected.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1.—Figures on the State ticket come in slowly, but show an invariable plurality for Beaver. His plurality in this city will not fall far below 25,000. The other candidates on the State ticket are well up with the lead. Bingham (Republican) is elected to Congress in the First District; O'Neil (Republican) in the Second; Randall (Democrat) in the Third; Kelley (Republican) in the Fourth; Harner (Republican) in the Fifth; Ernestout (Democrat) in the Sixth; Heislant (Republican) in the Seventh; Sowden (Democrat) in the Tenth; Buckland (Democrat) in the Eleventh; Bond (Republican) in the Fourteenth; Marsh (Democrat) in the Nineteenth; Dalsell (Republican) in the Twenty-second; Bayne (Republican) in the Twenty-third.

Allegheny County.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 2.—The returns from Allegheny county are coming in slowly and are badly mixed, owing to the unusual amount of "scratching." The indications, however, to-night are that the entire Republican State and County ticket, with the exception, possibly, of the Judges of Common Pleas Court, who is elected by a larger majority than the combined vote of Beaver and Stewart, the Republican and Independent candidates of the gubernatorial ticket in 1882, which was over 6,000. John Dalsell and Thomas M. Bayne, Republican candidates for Congress in the Twenty-second and Twenty-third Districts, respectively, are elected by good majorities. The streets are filled with enthusiastic partisans, and the noise from tin horns, etc., is deafening.

THE EMPIRE STATE.

Hewitt Elected Mayor—Rosovet and George Neck and Neck.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The election to-day resulted in a general Democratic victory. Hewitt carried the city by about 25,000 plurality. George and Rosovet ran neck and neck. The laboring men elected George fairly. All the Democratic Congressmen are probably re-elected, although one or two of them have decreased majorities.

BROOKLYN, Nov. 2.—Bliss (Dem.), Mahoney (Dem.), White (Rep.) and Campbell (Dem.), are undoubtedly elected to Congress from Kings county.

ALBANY, Nov. 2.—The probabilities are that the Democrats have carried the county and elected the entire ticket, including Kane over Swinburne for Congress.

GENEVA, Nov. 2.—Ira Davonport, Republican, for Congress, was elected without opposition.
