The Intelligence. WHEELING, W. VA., NOVEMBER 7, 1888. OCEANIC HAPPY. She Embarrassingly Proclaims Her Pleasure to be Home—She Was Getting Home.

New York, Nov. 6.—There was a bustle aboard the big Cunard Umbria at daybreak yesterday, when she came up to the wharf and moved up the bay. Earliest among the promenade paces a figure unrolled in a cape of Scotch gray. There was a black Gainsborough upon it, and yellow gloves and a clear, rosy complexion and bright eyes.

All her English company of 41 who are to help her next Monday at Palmer's Theatre to present "A Winter's Tale," were on shipboard as well. By and by the revenue cutter Chandler came up and Mr. Anderson, Mr. Marcus Mayer and C. F. Chatterton, Mr. Abbey's private secretary, who must all have got up at an early hour, climbed over the rail, red nosed and shivering in spite of their heavy overcoats, to welcome Miss Anderson and her attendant Theopians.

After breakfast at the Victoria Miss Anderson knelt at mass among the worshippers in St. Leo's, and the noon train bore her away home, with her family, to the Griffin residence at Irvington, N. Y. The house is a charming one, surrounded by huge trees and with a long carriage drive leading from the street. It is a street of mansions. On this state thoroughfare Jay Gould lives, a near neighbor.

In the luncheon parlor, among neat etchings and engravings and a water color of two, are two portraits of Miss Anderson, both of the school period, both rapt and pensive. They are unlike the gracious, cherry woman who after a minute or two entered with a pleasant greeting. She is not so lovely as the one in the water color. She is charming and is glad to get home. She had been walking, and, throwing over a chair the flimsy scarf she had worn, she said:

"I'm so glad to be back in America again. It's three years now since I went away, and truly I was getting homesick. They have been years of hard work, but, though true, I have spent considerable time leisurely through Europe."

Then she told what a good ship was the Umbria; what a jolly captain was Captain McMichael; how she had had no horrors for her, and she was seasick but a day. "I seemed like a double vessel to me this morning," she said, "to hear the church bells ringing just as I reached New York. You know it was about the same time last Sunday morning that an American came up to New York Bay in clear weather, and not feeling patriotic I cannot imagine. There was a blue in the sky this morning that you seldom see the like of anywhere in Italy." Miss Anderson has acquired and doesn't affect the British accent, but talking about the weather she added to the respectable traditions of the London fog this wise: "Why, I have penetrated to the theatres, and the audience seems to be in a sort of mist. It isn't so palpable to me. I suppose the bright light of the stage would obliterate it."

THE STEWART WILL. How Evidence Showing the Expensive Habits of the Late Widow—Diamonds and Horses Without Limit.

New York, Nov. 6.—John Charles Mercer continued today his elucidations of the accounts of the Stewart estate prior to Mrs. Stewart's death. The long detailed direct examination was concluded and the cross-examination began.

The witness continued to testify on the direct examination as to the payments from the Stewart estate on the Stewart building after the estate had passed into the hands of ex-Judge Hilton. The payments in this manner, from February 24, 1884, to date of the trial, amounted to \$180,710.31.

The witness testified that among the vouchers for expenses for Mrs. Stewart, in 1881, was one for jewelry from Tiffany & Co., amounting to \$2,300. To this was added an invoice for \$700 for diamonds and a ring for Henry Hilton. On June 1, 1881, there was an additional bill for \$800 for Mrs. Hilton was added.

Mrs. Stewart bought a great many horses from Mr. Hilton. In 1883 she was charged with three horses at \$500 each, and with two horses at \$500 each, and credited to Mr. Hilton. In October, 1883, Mr. Hilton was credited with nine horses sold to Garden City for \$1,750. In the same month he was credited with \$1,750 for more horses. On June 8, 1888, he paid \$1,000 for four horses. On June 23, 1870, the balance of debt to Mrs. Stewart's account was \$8,730.00.

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NEW YORK'S TALL SPIRES. St. Patrick's Cathedral as it Appears Above the Roof.

The twin spires of St. Patrick's Cathedral, completed last week, and to be shorn of their ugly scaffolding in a few days, are the tallest church spires in America and rank among the tallest in the world.

There are higher spires over European cathedrals, among them those at Vienna, Cologne, Chartres, Antwerp and Salisbury. Trinity spire in this city is 284 feet high. St. Patrick's spires, with the whole cathedral, were planned by and built under the supervision of James Hughes as first projected by Archbishop Hughes about 1850.

It was in 1853 Mr. Renwick drew the first plans. The corner stone was laid on August 15, 1858—thirty years, one month and nineteen days before the topmost stone was set in the last of the spires. The cathedral was dedicated nearly two years ago, but the spires were not on a level of the roof of the building. They were left in that condition until the fall of 1885, when work was resumed. It has since been continued.

For the last few weeks only five or six men could be employed, and they had to be expert stonecutters. The spires are of white marble, but the center holds the extreme upper pieces composed of the finest Italian marble. The spires are octagonal in form, mounted on octagonal lantern towers that rise from the level of the roof. Their design is very elaborate, and it has been carried out with exquisite workmanship that is almost wasted at the great height at which it is placed.

A Terrible Fate. BIRMINGHAM, ALA., Nov. 6.—News has reached this city of a terrible accident to a party of gold miners on Hog mountain, near Ashland City, Clay county, on Saturday afternoon. While four men were down in a pit some thirty feet deep the sides caved in completely burying them. A big force of men immediately set to work to rescue their lost comrades, but when reached John Wheeler was taken out dead, James Jones and Frank Smith were in a dying condition, and William Moore, the fourth man, was struck on the head and fatally hurt.
