THE prospect of an extra session of the new Congress increases every day. At the same rate there is a decreasing probability that stolen suits will be worth much on the dollar. This will be gall and wormwood to the receivers of stolen goods in West Virginia.

ONE Man of Fire.—The Fire Marshal of Brooklyn makes a suggestion which may be of great value in the prevention of fires. He calls attention to the highly inflammable materials used in the decoration of the show windows in retail stores, and adds that if more care were observed in this particular half the fires in Brooklyn would be prevented.

Nothing is more attractive than a tastefully decorated show window, unless it may be whole blocks and even miles of richly ornamented windows, forming a great popular museum through which one may walk without money and without price. Window dressing has become almost a fine art, so that in the great cities there are people who make a special business of it, and there are establishments which employ persons for their skill in this regard.

It, however, the beautiful picture be presented at a cost of momentary peril from fire, it is obviously worth while to get along with less ornamentation, or at least to substitute something attractive but less inflammable than laces and other flimsy fabrics which play a large part in window decorations.

THE Two Decisions.—The Intelligencer is far from impugning the motives of the Supreme Court of Appeals and the Circuit Court in Ohio county. But it seems odd that in that where the Democratic nominees gain by interference, a higher court interferes with the returning board; and where the Democratic interference, there can be no interference.

It is true that the cases are not just alike, but there is in each the same gain to the same party, which in one case secretly alters ballots and in the other boldly counts or refuses to count such ballots as it pleases.

THE decision in Ohio county has no practical effect on the issue now involved, since the certificate has been forwarded and Pendleton is to be returned as elected to Congress from the First District. Mr. Pendleton will be seen later before a tribunal which has full jurisdiction over the case and which, in the interest of the majority of the people, of fair play and of common decency, will make short work of his flimsy pretensions.

So it will be in the Third District case, where the Democratic nominee has been counted in by somebody who knew the way to the ballots in the office of the Clerk of the County Court.

Abolish the Internal Revenue Establishment.—In the past fiscal year internal revenue taxes took from the people of the United States \$124,230,475, every dollar of which was wrongfully taken. Of this sum \$65,278 was taken from the people of West Virginia.

Internal taxes in the United States have always been war taxes, levied for war purposes and not for any other purposes. The present system is the third internal tax system in the history of this country. The two previous internal tax systems were abolished when the occasion had passed which had brought them into existence.

The present system is more onerous, because more comprehensive and complicated, than those which have preceded it. It is not popular and yet it has been thus far impossible to get rid of it because the party in power has never been willing to let go; and because, in the case of the Democratic party, there has been added to the greed of office a desire to break down the protective tariff system, to which end a large and increasing internal revenue contributes powerfully.

When the Republican party was in control of the Executive branch of the government the Democrats denounced the internal revenue system as an unnecessary revenue of taxes and a dangerous piece of political machinery. They charged that every internal revenue officer was made a campaign agent of the Republican party. Republicans themselves know that internal revenue officers were used to secure the nomination desired by their superiors.

When the Democratic party got control of the Executive branch of the Government it forgot all about the enormity of the internal revenue system, but did not forget that internal revenue officers were very handy to have about to secure

The vote of the Union Labor party in Indiana was not very heavy, numbering only 2,694. A monster 111-ton cannon recently manufactured in Germany carries twenty miles.

From Pittsburgh it is reported that 6,000 miners are out of work on account of the closing of collieries along the Monongahela river.

There will be but four farmers in the next Missouri State Senate, and only one merchant, while the lawyers number twenty-two.

All the Pittsburgh furnaces are in blast, and the business of the iron workers is pressing, with wages running from \$30 to \$50 per week.

A farmer in Vermillion county, Ill., and his eight sons were stricken with diphtheria recently. At last accounts two of the sons had died.

The Chesapeake & Ohio is having built 1,000 cars, 800 coal and 200 platform, at the Indianapolis Car and Manufacturing Company's works.

Michael Jordan, a Lawrence county, Pa., farmer, who has just died, left \$30,000 to the First Presbyterian church of Pleasant Grove, established in 1770.

Eighteen of the collieries of the Philadelphia & Reading Company have been closed till next March, while thirty-seven others are to be run on three-quarter time.

About forty petrified bodies were recently recovered from the Milwaukee coal mine in Japan. They were the bodies of workmen buried alive in the mine several years ago.

The Minnesota Iron Company will ship this year by rail and lake fully 450,000 tons of iron ore. The Chandler mine in Minnesota will also ship between 50,000 and 55,000 tons.
