A BIG GRIST-GROUND OUT

By the Grand Jury, Which Made its Return Yesterday.

A LIST OF THE INDICTMENTS

Comprises Twenty Felonies, Twenty Petit Larcenies and One Hundred and Ten Misdemeanors—Who the Unfortunates Are.

The Grand Jury made its return about 10 o'clock yesterday morning before Judge Campbell in Part II of the Circuit Court. They returned one hundred and fifty true bills, and forty not true bills.

Of the true bills, twenty are for felonies, twenty for petit larceny and one hundred and ten for misdemeanors. Of the indictments found for misdemeanors, twenty-nine are against baseball players who were arrested at the time an effort was being made to stop Sunday ball playing on the island. The city solicitors who sell on Sunday got off very light, only two of them being indicted.

The Fulton violators of the Sunday laws and the law in relation to selling to minors, were also overlooked, but Pestinger, of Elm Grove, got it in the neck, so to speak, there being a total of twenty-four counts found against him. Those who run houses to be used as houses of ill fame were also among the fortunate ones.

The circumstances connected with the felony cases the public generally are acquainted with the details having been published at the time of their occurrence. Several of the trials that will be had in connection with them, promise to be very interesting. Mr. John H. Hall was foreman of the Grand Jury. The full return will be found below.
