There is rarely any interference with it. If indictments come, one hundred will be no worse than two. The rule is to confess on two, settle up and go on as before.

All this being so true that nobody will deny any part of it, why does not the Sunday Saloon throw off the thin mask which hides nothing? Why put patrons to the trouble of entering through the side door or slipping in through the alley gate? There is no secrecy about either of those ways to get there.

Not an officer of the law from the highest to the humblest is ignorant of any part of all that goes on. The crowds are seen to go in and come out in various stages of drunkenness, the clinking of the glasses and all the multitudinous noises of the barroom are heard on the sidewalk,—why does not the Sunday Saloon set a good example to the officers of the law, cease playing hypocrite and declare itself to be what everybody knows it is?

There can be no danger in this course, for the Sunday Saloon is master of the situation. It is more numerous than the churches. It is more powerful than the whole force of law-abiding citizens who mildly oppose it, lacking the courage of their convictions. It should take down its shutters, open its doors and achieve a new conquest over the law. The Sunday Saloon should understand that there is no limit to what it may do if it wants to. Occupying this exceptional position, it should make the most of its opportunities while they last.

The Contest in Ohio. Foraker and Campbell each closed the campaign on Saturday night with a big meeting in Cincinnati. The State is claimed by each party. The Republicans give figures. The Democrats give the assurance that they are going to win.

The chances are largely in Foraker's favor, and it does not seem that his popularity will fall below 12,000. The figures of the Republican committee are higher, but committee are from conservative. The lighter the vote the more the Democrats expect to gain. This means that they do not intend to have a very long list of stay-at-home Democrats. Their organization, made light of by Republicans, is probably better than Republican know or are willing to admit.

The real contest in Ohio is for the Legislature. This is what the rich men of the Democratic party are spending their money for, each of them encouraged by the ease with which Payne secured the caucus nomination for the Senate. Payne was nobody in politics in Ohio. He had not been regarded as a Senatorial probability. The presentation of his claims came late, but it came in the convincing form of legal tender, and it stayed the Republican caucus. Payne hopes to repeat the same tactics with the same success. He has the best chance of succeeding with a Democratic Legislature.

A careful survey of the field encourages the hope that the Legislature will be Republican, but this can come only by reason of hard fighting on the Republican side until the closing of the polls and close watchful until the delivery of the returns. The result depends on about thirty districts, and Republicans may be sure that Democratic money will not be scarce in those districts. THE IRON TRADE

A Careful Review and Concise Statement of the Situation. Philadelphia Record of Saturday. Considering the enormous consumption of iron and steel in progress the week's business has been light, most consumers have very liberally covered requirements for two to three months, and at the present prices of finished products they are not anxious to place orders for more remote delivery, except at shaded quotations. Makers of raw material encourage the present situation, buyers, for they believe that every thing points to higher prices and a greater scarcity of material. Both sides are resting on their arms, so to speak. The advancing tendency has reached its limits for the present, but the market is in such a feverish and unsettled condition that it would take very little to throw a large amount of winter business into manufacturers' hands. A conservative opinion is that the market is apt to be postponed the matter of an advance on pipes for a short time. The market is a little higher, and their Eastern co-workers are contemplating an additional improvement because of the heavy consumption and diminished stocks. Steel and galvanized iron is selling for slightly higher prices than a month ago, and has been established next week. Merchant steel of all grades is pointing upward, although prices have been stationary for two weeks. Plate and structural iron hold their own, and winter and spring buyers have been lately aroused to the importance of taking care of their future wants at fixed prices or for determined deliveries. Buyers behind the scenes know there is a very large amount of business yet to place. The railroad companies all over the country have been following an economic rather than a liberal policy in the matter of rolling stock, locomotive power and general equipment. This policy is being changed by a good many roads, and if all began to order heavily there is no telling what would befall prices in the iron trade. Car builders stated this week they have just received inquiries for cars. Locomotive builders have a rush of orders. Equipment manufacturers are all running full time. The makers of general and special machinery are also beginning to work overtime in many places, and are duplicating orders for the coming year. All these points deserve notice as indicating the probability of another rush of orders before the holidays for delivery during the first quarter of next year. The pig-iron market possesses more than ordinary interest because of the alleged statistical evidence of the insufficiency of present sources of supply to meet current demands. There are two sides to this question. More or less speculative buying has been done, especially in the West, against the possibility of an advance. Great activity exists in Bessemer pig, and under the influence of heavy transactions prices are now quoted at \$18.50 to \$20.00 for furnace cast and \$21.00 for Western Pennsylvania. With advancing force and a threatened demand for higher wages at one or two localities west the situation is not encouraging. Steel billets and slabs keep high, but buyers have no recourse, and \$40.00 to \$45.00 have advanced abroad and in tide-water markets, and buyers are not haggling over prices. Steel rail sales for the week are reported at 2200 tons, exclusive of small lots. Quotations \$23 to \$23.50 and \$25 West. Concessions not mentioned. Shipments are given by the Board of Control to October 1 at 919,734 tons. The railmakers admit that there is more or less holding of any grade of old roads contemplating additions, owing to the advances made in rails during the past few months. The increase in railroad traffic over that of a year ago is exerting a favorable influence on the market for new enterprises, but it is partly counteracted by the higher cost of material. The active and healthy condition of British and Continental markets lessens the probability of obtaining supplies of any kind from abroad, and enhances the cost of such imports as are made. It is too soon to say that the symptoms of higher prices and of greater scarcity of raw materials are sufficiently strong to warrant conservative men in departing from the policy they have been following for the past five months.
