

A BLOODLESS DUEL.

Which Ends in the Death of One of the Participants.

MEXICAN COWBOYS QUARREL.

Over the Possession of a Cow—Being Unarmed, They Try to Lasso Each Other—One Caught and Jerked from His Horse.

MOORE STATION, TEX., June 11.—A novel duel was fought near here yesterday between two Mexican boys named Jose Carrasco and Manuel Bosco. They met on horseback and quarreled over the possession of a cow. Carrasco took umbrage at the lasso passed, and threw his lariat over Bosco's head. The latter evaded it, and then began their bloodless duel on record. Neither man was armed with a gun, and their sole weapon, the lariat, biased in menacing circles about each other's head, only to be ducked and evaded, as its tightening coils meant a horrible death at dragging at the rival's horse's heels. They were dashing along the road side by side like whirlwinds, when Bosco glanced aside for a fatal moment, and Carrasco, seeing his coil over Bosco's head, then jerked his lasso suddenly, and dashed in the opposite direction. Bosco was jerked from his horse's back so suddenly his neck was broken. Infuriated Carrasco dragged the dead body along the road for a mile, then coolly untied his lasso and left it.

A LARGE CROWD ATTENDS.

MORGANTOWN, W. ONE ROBBER CAUGHT.

Who Helped Hold Up the Northern Pacific Train.

FIVE MEN ENGAGED IN IT.

The Man Caught Makes a Desperate Effort to Escape—He Afterwards Offers the Sheriff a Thousand Dollars to Release Him.

DICKINSON, N. D., June 11.—Intense excitement prevailed here last evening when the news spread that Sheriff Hayes, of this county, had captured one of the participants in the robbery of the Northern Pacific train at Salem last Sunday. The Sheriff and two of his men arrived with the prisoner and lodged him in jail. In crossing Grand river, about sixty miles south of here, the robber's horse was injured, compelling him to stop on his flight, and when the officers first discovered the train yesterday morning he made a desperate effort to escape, but after a race of several miles and seeing that escape was impossible, he surrendered.

ROBBED HIS SISTER.

A Little Girl Fatally Burned by Her Brother.

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HAZLETON, Pa., June 11.—Nellie Daugherty, aged 11 years, was fatally burned yesterday by her brother, who is about a year younger. The children had been fishing, and the boy built a fire to roast some frogs. Becoming enraged at his sister for some trivial act, he dragged her to the fire, and held her over it until her clothing became ignited. The fire caught the girl's hair, but he delayed too long, and all efforts to put them out failed. In her desperation, the poor child leaped herself into the creek. Some men who were passing arrived just in time to save the boy whose clothing had also caught fire. The little girl died a few hours later. Her body is badly burned but will recover.

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
