Senator Hoar has introduced a resolution in the Senate abolishing the appointment system so far as postmasters are concerned, and providing that they shall be elected by the patrons of the office. This would remove one of the greatest embarrassments with which an administration has to contend, and would be true civil service reform, but it is doubtful if the measure will be popular among the politicians.

Heads of families, or other adult members, should bear in mind the importance of giving census enumerators the information called for, and not trust the matter to their servants or children, who are generally incompetent to answer the questions accurately, and do not appreciate the importance of a correct enumeration. Enumerators should, in all cases, insist upon the most accurate information. Two minutes in their haste to get through with the work, are very careless in this particular. Persons knowing of any omissions should report to the enumerators, as it is to the city's interest that a correct report of her population, wealth, etc., shall be made.

Mr. Alderson was not fairly elected to Congress and Governor Wilson knew it, but he was elected in the Fourth district, and that John O. Penland was not elected in the First district. In the Fourth district this detestable politician and ballot reform advocate, known as Governor E. Willis Wilson, granted a certificate of election to the defeated Democratic candidate by misinterpreting an item made by a county clerk in returning the result of the election. "Two" was written carelessly, and the detestable Governor, finding it necessary to "elect" the Democratic candidate, even if he had to sacrifice his conscience to do so, decided that this "two" should read "twelve," and that the clerk meant to write "twelve," though why he did not decide that "twenty" was meant has not yet explained. So he decided that the Democratic candidate was elected, and granted the certificate accordingly. Again the Democratic members of the Congressional Committee on Elections turned down our ballot reform Governor and refused to countenance one of the most barefaced attempts to defraud the people of their rights ever perpetrated in West Virginia.

These things are of far greater importance than the mere question of partisan politics, and if the proper kind of candidates are chosen by the respective parties—men of progressive business sense—we will be certain to have a competent set of legislators, and the political questions as well as the business interests of the State will be in safe hands.
