The Tariff and Trusts. To the Editor of the Intelligencer. Sir:—As to the result of the recent elections, permit me to say a few words.

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Everybody knows that the number is much larger than it should be or need be. Some things may be predicted with reasonable certainty, and one of these is that boys and girls who run the streets at night are bed-lambs for the devil.

A considerable part of the work of reform must be undertaken by parents; another part will await the maturing of a public sentiment that will make itself felt in the administration of the laws.

Opponents of the Conger pure lard bill, which has passed the House, are urging commercial bodies and the press to antagonize the further progress of the measure. They insist that the bill is unsafe because lard compound is a wholesome product, and they point to the fact that pure hog lard is often made of the fat of diseased swine.

It is very desirable to protect consumers against impure hog lard; but this is not the question with which the Conger bill deals. By this measure it is attempted to make lard compound stand on its own merits, be the same great or small.

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
