### Transfers Recorded.

Clerk Hook yesterday admitted to record a deed made June 20, by Margaret Waters and others to Mary Higgins, wife of T. H. Higgins, in consideration of \$1,000, for lot 3 in square 2 in Waters' addition, fronting forty-one feet on the west side of South Broadway. Also a deed made May 6, by William H. Travis and wife to Harry D. Travis, in consideration of \$500, for lot 6 in square 4 in Gilchrist's addition No. 3.

### Increased Mail Facilities.

Mr. Alonzo Burt, superintendent of the fifth division of the railway mail service, with headquarters at Cincinnati, was in town yesterday, the guest of his kinsman, Mr. J. A. Metcalf, assistant postmaster. He had been at Bellaire to consult with Postmaster Darrah in regard to putting on a special messenger to carry the mails between the Ohio River railroad station at Benwood and the office at Bellaire. This would be a decided convenience to the business men at Bellaire.

### The Republican League in Ohio.

An entirely new feature in Ohio politics this year will be the work of the Ohio League of Republican clubs. There are about 400 of these clubs, all of which are directly affiliated with and managed by the central organization. This campaign, for the first time in the history of Ohio, and perhaps any State, the clubs will be made a direct factor of campaign work.

Fifty new subordinate organizations have been added already this month. It is expected to keep from 10 to 20 men in the field, and from the present time until late in the campaign it is anticipated that an average of 75 new organizations will be added each week.

The purpose and object of Republican league clubs is principally educational. Numerous questions have been crowded into this campaign which need discussion. Most notable among them are the tariff question, the currency question, the income tax, and last, but by no means least, the operation of the new election law. All of these are legitimate subjects for club work.

Large clubs have recently been organized at Toronto, Steubenville, Mingo, Cadiz, Martin's Ferry, Bridgeport, Bellaire and St. Clairsville.

### The Minstrel's Friday Night.

Mr. W. S. Cleveland, the famous young minstrel manager, has in contemplation the establishment of a grand minstrel annex to the Chicago World's Fair. Its consummation would be one of the grandest amusement enterprises in the annals of stage history. Mr. Cleveland will try to get possession of the Chicago Auditorium, and if satisfactory arrangements cannot be completed, he will form a stock company to build a theatre for him on the plan of the Madison Square Garden in New York. About two hundred people would be employed in the performance, including comedians, musicians, terpsichorean artists, scene painters, costumers, electricians, and an orchestra of sixty-five selected musicians, property makers and calcium light men. This is Mr. Cleveland's pet theme, and he will make it a feature of the Columbian Exposition if his present plans are carried out. It is his intention to open simultaneously with the Fair. Cleveland is the greatest schemer alive, and has the greatest minstrel show, which will be seen at the Wheeling Opera House Friday night. Reserved seats are on sale at House's music store.

### The "Little Tycoon" Coming.

The fascinating opera, "The Little Tycoon," which is now on its farewell tour, will be presented at the Opera House, Wednesday, September 9, with the finished comedian, R. E. Graham, in his original creation of General Knickerbocker; Joseph Mealey, the original Teddy; Alice Hosmer, the clever Miss Hurricane; Mamie Cerbi, the original Dolly; Jessie Giles, the beautiful Violet; Banks Winters, the southern tenor, and Chas. Shrove, the popular baritone, are important members of the organization. This will positively be the last presentation of the opera in Wheeling.

### Mr. Keene and Mr. Hennig.

Thomas W. Keene, the great tragedian, will open his season at the Wheeling Opera House, Thursday evening, August 27, in the revised version of "Louis XI," playing the title role, with Frank Hennig as Duc de Nemours, in the leading role. This piece was given by Mr. Keene at a matinee when he played here last year. Mr. Hennig then took the part of Collier, the physician. Mr. Hennig's many friends will be glad to learn that he has been made leading man in Keene's company, all of whom are actors of marked ability.

### THE NEW CITY BANK.

The Impending Proportions of the Granite Structure now in Progress of Construction.

Work on the new City bank building on Market street is progressing rapidly, and now that the first story is almost finished, passers-by can form some idea of the magnitude of what the six story edifice will look like. The front will be of Fox Island granite, quarried on Fox Island, sixteen miles northeast of Rockland, Me. The texture, strength and softness of tone of this granite has gained for it a high reputation, making the demand for it something remarkable. The large polished columns now in place are quarried on Jonesboro Island, which lies about one hundred miles north of Fox Island.

Mr. R. F. Reinhardt, a member of the firm of P. Reinhalter & Co., lessees of these two islands, is in the city and will remain for some time to see that everything is satisfactory.

To one unacquainted with the intricacies of building the figures estimating the weight of the granite front alone, given by Mr. Reinhardt, will cause astonishment. The weight of the granite on the first story alone is 140 tons, while that of the whole front of six stories is over 600 tons. The polished columns alone weigh nine tons, and two pieces of granite yet to be placed on the first story weigh eleven tons each. The building when completed will present a more handsome appearance than any building in Pittsburgh, although it will not compete in size. It will contain twenty-five office rooms.

The firm furnishing this granite has a national reputation. It is now building a mausoleum for Emma Abbott, the noted opera singer who died last year. The cost is to be \$50,000, and it will be the finest individual monument ever built. Mr. Reinhardt designed it.

### THE COMING STATE FAIR.

The Ladies' Department—A few Words about the Exhibition of Art and Fancy Work.

This management and ladies in charge of this department have made every possible arrangement for the convenience of those who desire to exhibit in these classes.

The position of the Exposition building which this department occupies has been newly refitted, and will be found very attractive.

It is very much desired that the ladies and children of the city and surrounding towns make a special effort this year in showing their handiwork. They are certainly as skillful as in other cities. The art and fancy work exhibit has become the leading feature at all the large expositions and fairs of the country; and the local management expects to keep up with the general move.

The articles for which premiums are offered in the fancy work department embrace all kinds of knit, crocheted, needle work (both machine and hand) paper work, and braiding and lace, and all kinds of fancy articles.

Regarding the art exhibit, several of the leading art schools have arranged to place their pupil's work on exhibition, in addition to what they will have to compete for premiums. It is to be hoped that all the art schools will take a similar interest.

Misses Annie Reymann and Louie Lang and a committee of ladies are in charge of this department, the success of which is therefore assured.

### LOTS OF PEOPLE WANTED.

Signs of an Epidemic of Crime in various Parts of the Country.

Chief of Police Delbrugge yesterday received an unusually large number of notices concerning thieves and other criminals who are wanted at various places. It looks as if the crooks of the country at large were moved by one impulse to ply their vocation. Christina Borg, of Buffalo, offers a reward of \$25 for the recovery of a watch and chain stolen from her recently by a young man, unknown, but of whom a minute description is given.

A reward of \$50 has been offered for the arrest of C. C. Rogers, who robbed a jewelry store in Asheville, N. C., recently, and Chief Delbrugge received a description of the man from Deputy Sheriff I. H. Hamilton, of Asheville. He is a jeweler by trade and is about forty-five years of age.

Chief Delbrugge also received a letter from R. C. Morton, of 96 West First avenue, Columbus, Ohio, stating that Charles C. Morton, aged seventeen, had run away, and asking him to be on the lookout for him. He is described as being of light complexion, having blue eyes, and rather large for his age.

A. B. Connelly, chief of police at Atlanta, Ga., notifies Chief Delbrugge of an offer of \$10 reward for Alex Grotte, aged about thirty, a tailor by trade, who is wanted there for cheating and swindling.

### THE ATLANTIC ENGINE HOUSE

To be Bid for Again—Joint Session of the Police and Fire Committees.

The Council committees on police and fire department held a joint session last night and discussed the plans for the changes in the Atlantic engine house, as prepared by Architect Hamilton. The plans provide for the doors to be on the Eoff street side of the house, and space is arranged for the patrol horse and wagon. The work has already been bid on, but the two bids received were considered too high. Some changes were made in the thickness of the flooring, and bids will be advertised for again in the daily papers. The time for the reception of bids expires Monday evening. The fire committee has only \$500 on hand for the purpose of the repairs, and the police committee has agreed to pay the remainder.


