The Strike Settled. The strike at the Standard mill, due to a disagreement between the rollers and roughers, was settled amicably yesterday, and the mill will resume work this morning. The terms of the agreement will govern the other neighboring mills.

Improvements at Belvedere. The owners of the Belvedere addition, around the hill, Messrs. Bieberon, Happy and Schmidt, have commenced the work of grading the streets in the addition. They propose to put the addition in good shape before turning it over to the city. Lots are in good and steady demand there, and several good houses are now in progress of erection.

Wellsburg's Glass Houses. The Eagle glass works at Lazenaville yesterday closed a contract for a new ten pot furnace, to be built in addition to their present furnaces. Work is to begin at once. The new bottle works being built at Wellsburg by the Brooke Glass company are about completed, and are expected to start up about October 5. They will employ about one hundred hands.

Ahead of California. Mr. W. L. M. Dowler, who lives in Marshall county, on the Wheeling and Fairmont pike, left at the Intelligencer office six peaches grown on a tree on his place, which averaged over eight ounces each. They are seedlings, planted by Mr. Dowler, and are delicious tasted. There were about twenty bushels of the peaches on the tree this year, much less than usual, owing to the late frosts.

A Lost Child. Mr. McCullough found the child at Mr. Lawn's and sent it home. The child had been at Mr. Lawn's before with its mother.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT.

The Business Transacted at Yesterday's Session.

Suit was entered in the circuit court yesterday by the city to condemn a strip of land of Mrs. Leticia McCluskey's property, west of McCulloch street, around the hill, to extend to Alley H. The case of Thomas Roberts & Co. against S. Baer's Sons was continued at the defendant's costs. In the case of Hattie Grantham vs. Ellen Barnes, for damages for false imprisonment, the plaintiff after the case was partly heard withdrew a juror and took a non-suit with \$5 damages to the defendant. L. Bernhard and Joseph Ranscher, jurors, were called and came not, and rules were issued for them to appear at 9 a. m. to-day and show cause why they should not be fined for contempt of court. Newt Criswell, attorney for John Dickey, in jail under the bad fame act by commitment of Squire Arkle, got a writ of habeas corpus for his client, and after a hearing Judge Paul discharged Dickey.

IN POLICE CIRCLES.

Thieves, Escaped Prisoners and Divers Other Offenders Yesterday. The police were notified that Ben Pennington, who had boarded with Frank Tucker, in North Wheeling, had disappeared, taking along a gold watch of the landlord's and leaving a board bill of \$30. A canary bird and cage were stolen from Mr. Will Tiernan Tuesday evening by some boys. There were twelve cases in the police court yesterday morning. Six were dismissed, three postponed, one man went to the hill and two paid their fines. Notice has been received at police headquarters of the escape of Martin Connolly, of Beaver Falls, and Jack Giles, of Erie, from the Morgantown reform school. A reward of \$10 each is offered for their recapture. Officer West yesterday arrested John Pearl, drunk, in the Second ward, and gave him a ride in the wagon. West also ran in Charley Hill for fighting in the Second ward.
