HON. WILLIAM KEMBLE DEAD. He Suddenly Dies of Heart Trouble at His Country Residence. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 27.—Hon. William Kemble died at his home this morning. Mr. Kemble's death occurred shortly after midnight.

Deceased was born in Woodbury, N. J., in 1828. He had been identified with politics from his youth and was always high in the councils of the Republican party.

Mr. Kemble, a member of the firm of Widener, Elkins & Kemble, has been for several years largely interested in traction street railways in Philadelphia, New York, Baltimore, Pittsburgh and other cities.

THE RUSH FOR LOTS. Will Begin To-day at Chandler—Fears that there will be Bloodshed. GUTHRIE, Okla., Sept. 27.—A courier just in from Chandler brings the following dispatch from the Associated Press correspondent:

"They are still at the post and in all probability the flag will not fall for the great race for town lots until Monday noon. The people about the site are restless, but the restlessness is kept within bounds by the military and United States Deputy Marshals.

When the town site is opened at least 2,000 people on foot and horseback will make a dash for the center, each intent on getting a corner lot. It will be a hazardous dash through woods and over rocks the final result of which may be a list of dead and wounded."
