While the INTELLIGENCER agrees with a few things said by Rev. Dr. A. Moore yesterday in his remarks on "Better Daily Literature," delivered at the North street church, in which he took occasion to score the press of this city, it begs leave to take issue with him in some things.

The doctor conceives it to be one of his pastoral duties to assist in raising the standard of the daily press by cultivating among his people a desire for "better daily literature," all laymen, including the "irreligious" editors themselves, should join with him in the crusade.

When, for instance, Dr. Moore says in effect that the daily press of this city gives more space to the reports of sporting events and sensational news than to occurrences in the religious world, he makes a violent statement and one which is not borne out by facts.
