**A Damage Suit.**  
 The case of Philip Roush et al. against the Penwood iron works, for causing the death of Charles N. Roush, June 19, 1891, by the explosion of a boiler while he was sleeping in his boat house, near the Penwood property at Martin's Ferry, will be up for trial in the United States court at Columbus about the first of June. The amount sued for is \$10,000.

**New Train Service.**  
 A new time card will take effect on the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad next Sunday night. Some very desirable changes will be made, and it is said that a sleeper will be run via Wheeling between Toledo and Washington, D. C. A new schedule will also go into effect on the Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling road next Sunday. A train will leave Bridgeport for Cleveland early in the morning.

**A Store shoe Robbed.**  
 Some time night before last the shoe shop of D. W. Fife, on Sixteenth street, near the English Lutheran Church, was broken into and robbed. There were a good many shoes in the place, but the thief took only two pairs, one belonging to Sam Harrison and the other to John Handlan. Both had been nicely resoled and were ready for delivery. The police were notified, but there was no clue to the thief.

**In the Police Court.**  
 There were four cases before the mayor yesterday. Pat O'Keefe, for a plain drunk, went up for fifteen days in default of \$1 and costs. Dave Lancaster and Mrs. Rhoda Davis, after a long and mixed hearing, were fined \$2 and costs each for disorderly conduct, and Lancaster \$1 besides for carrying metal knuckles. One of the prisoners did the sneak act, and nearly escaped while court was in progress.

**Trouble With the Wires.**  
 For the last two or three days there has been a good deal of trouble with the electric light wires, the fire alarm wires and other wires. This accounts for the frequent erratic tapping of the city hall clock. Day before yesterday there were three separate breaks in the fire alarm wires. Yesterday there was another. Last night one of the city electric light wires got down, and Superintendent Capps had to hustle to repair the damage. One of the broken wires of the fire alarm system wrapped around an electric light wire, and there was such a humming in the alarm gongs as was never heard before.

**GAVE HIMSELF UP.**  
 A Man who Broke Jail at St. Clairsville Five Years ago Returns.  
 Yesterday afternoon a stranger walked into Joe McConaughy's saloon, in Bridgeport, and asked Joe if he was still marshal. On being informed that he was not, the man said his name was John Ayers, and that five years ago he had broken into the depot at Flushing, was arrested and placed in jail at St. Clairsville, and with several others, had broken out of jail, and during five years had been in Pennsylvania. He had come back to deliver himself up and stand trial.  
 The man was turned over to Police-man Sauters, and taken to St. Clairsville. His story was true.

# LICENSES ARE GIVEN

To the Three Saloons Which the Committee Turned Down.

## ONE IS PRONOUNCED DISORDERLY

By a Councillman in the Open Meeting, but That Makes No Difference. The Whole Business Turned Into a Shameful Farce, and the Committee Saubbed—Other Business Last Night.

The City Council of Wheeling covered itself with glory yesterday evening. At the former meeting of Council the applications for liquor license of Troesch & Kierey, Nick Asselta, Andy Fisher and George Watson were reported on unfavorably by the committee on petitions and remonstrances. Council would not adopt the committee's recommendation and sent back the report to the committee, with instructions to report again. The committee, however, was not afraid to take whatever responsibility would accrue, and sent back the report yesterday evening, still recommending that the applications be rejected. Council now had to deal with the matter itself. Nick Asselta's license was the first to come up.

Mr. McGinley said that at the meeting of the committee on petitions and remonstrances the saloon keepers mentioned in the report had brought in some of their immediate neighbors and proved that their places were run all right. Mr. McGinley further said that the committee did not want to stultify its former action, and hence had voted again to reject the applications. Mr. Hadlich said that Mr. Asselta, the applicant, came from a foreign city with the best of references. He (Mr. Hadlich) had heard of no complaints and he thought the license ought to be granted. Mr. Vierheller, a councillorman from the same ward, said the proprietor had promised a complete reformation, and so thought the license ought to be granted.

**MR. EMSHEIMER SPEAKS BOLDLY.**  
 Mr. Bailey said the fault lay with the police and the laws, not with the saloon-keepers. The license was granted. Most of those present excused their votes, by laying the blame on Messrs. Hadlich and Vierheller, who, as members from Asselta's ward, were in favor of granting the license.

The application of Andrew Fisher came up. Mr. Bailey, the member from that ward in which the saloon is located, said what amounted to this in effect: that if Fisher kept a disorderly place, it wasn't his fault, but the fault of the law. The application of George Watson was also granted. Henry Newhart was granted a license to keep a saloon at Troesch & Kierey's old place.

When Asselta's license came up in the first branch, a motion to non-concur was made. Mr. Emshimer and Mr. Wilson made strong speeches against the action of the second branch, Mr. Emshimer claiming that police officers had said the house was practically an assignment house. Mr. Pollock advocated granting the license. The motion to non-concur with the second branch and to refuse to grant the license was lost, and the license was granted. In the first branch those opposed to disorderly saloons which harbor dissolute characters were Messrs. Dobbins, Emshimer, Farrell, O'Kane and Wilson.

**HOW THEY VOTED.**  
 Those in favor of licensing such places, to judge from their votes, were Messrs. Caldwell, Happy, Horstman, Pollock, Wiedebusch and Mayor Seabright. In the second branch those opposed to licensing such houses were Messrs. Brock, Freese, O'Leary and Jepsen. Those in favor of continuing the wide-open style of things, in Asselta's case at least, and presumably in the others, were Messrs. Bailey, Craig, Filan, Hadlich, Hoe, Irwin, Kalbitzer, Kenny, Morningstar, McGinley, Robertson, Vierheller, Weitzell and Zoeckler.

The committee on railroads recommended granting to Edward Westwood the privilege of laying a switch on McCulloch street, across Alley 18.

Councillman Joseph Freese handed in his resignation as a member of the committee on petitions and remonstrances, and it was laid on the table.

The new City Hospital was granted free gas, as the North Wheeling Hospital gets the same privilege.

Telephones were ordered put in at Chief Healy's and Chief McNichol's residences, and one at the electric light plant. Superintendent Capps, of the electric light plant, needed one also, but as the thirty free telephones the city is to get from the telephone company are already in use, Council refused to pay for a telephone for Mr. Capps. It is necessary and important that the superintendent have a telephone handy, in case of accident at the light plant.

The following department bills were ordered paid: Fire department, \$571 67; police department, \$10 50, and the stone bridge, \$2,400.
