

In the Circuit Court.

In Part I of the circuit court yesterday, Judge Campbell on the bench, William M. Handlan confessed judgment on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday, appealed from the police court, and judgment was given for \$20 and the costs in the police court and in this court.

In Part II, Judge Paull, in the case of Robert F. Williamson vs. the Riverside Building Association, County Clerk Hook was ordered to release a certain deed of trust.

They had no Meetings.

The Council committee on scales was called to meet last evening, but for the second time failed to get a quorum. The railroad committee was also called to take action on the petitions of the Wheeling bakery and the Wheeling Lamp and Stamping companies for permission to lay switches to their works. Gentlemen interested in the companies were on hand, as usual, but the only members of the committee who showed up were Chairman Farrell, Mr. Irwin and Mr. O'Kane. Even under the peculiarly liberal rules of Council three is not a quorum of eight, and after waiting till after nine o'clock the three members departed.

A SHORT SESSION

Of the Board of Education Held Last Evening.

ROUTINE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

The Monthly Reports and the Financial Matters Appropriately Acted Upon—The Annual Commencement Provided For—Fulton Pupils' Tuition.

The adjourned meeting of the Board of Education was held last night, the Board having failed to get a quorum last Thursday night.

Bills aggregating \$1,873.89 were ordered paid. The Board approved the librarian's report, which showed that the circulation of books for the month of April was 4,504; the circulation per day 188; the circulation in the reading room 1,202, and the amount received for fines \$12.

The Board of Education of Fulton was granted \$126.55 out of the school fund of Washington and Madison district schools to pay for the tuition of pupils resident in Wheeling. Mrs. Crawford and Miss Dalloy were reappointed assistant librarians at salaries of \$40 each per month.

The monthly report of the city superintendent was received and filed. Following is an abstract:

In the German department there were 236 pupils of German parentage and 233 not of German parentage, and in the month \$195 was paid five teachers for instruction in German.

Judge Boyd and Mr. Duckman were on motion appointed on the committees of which their predecessors, Messrs. Acker and Bloch, were members.

Thirty dollars were appropriated for a new gutter on the Ritchie school building, and \$25 for cleaning a cesspool at the Sixth ward school.

A resolution was passed appropriating \$150 for the expenses of the annual commencement exercises. The same scheme of distribution of tickets as that of last year was adopted.

The tickets for the commencement exercises will be distributed as follows: Each member of the board of education gets two, each graduate five, each member of the junior class one, and each teacher one. The rest of the tickets will be given those adults who call for them—first come, first served.

Dr. Pipes suggested that the Ritchie school would like to have a new flag, the old one, presented by the Jr. O. U. A. M., having been worn out. There was no response to the doctor's suggestion and the matter dropped. The Jr. O. U. A. M. will probably donate another flag.

Additional Trains Between Wheeling and Moundsville.

The Baltimore & Ohio railroad company has greatly improved the train service between Wheeling and Moundsville by the addition of three trains, daily, except Sunday, which were inaugurated with the new summer schedule on Sunday, May 22. By this addition there are now four trains daily, except Sunday, between Wheeling and Moundsville. They are as follows: Leave Wheeling at 7.00, 11.40, a. m., 6.10 and 10.45 p. m. Leave Moundsville 6.00, 7.05, 7.55 and 12.30 p. m. The train which heretofore left Wheeling at 6.00 a. m., will hereafter leave at 6.10 a. m., and will run only to Moundsville and not to Cameron as heretofore. The change in time of the Gratton morning local will prove of great convenience to the residents of Cameron and other towns along the line.
