On a Bad Charge.

Fred S. Davis was arrested by Deputy U. S. Marshal G. W. Robinson, and arraigned before U. S. Commissioner J. E. Campbell, on a charge of sending a letter through the mail in which was enclosed a lewd, lascivious and indecent picture. The arrest was under section 3893 of the revised statutes. He was held in bond for his appearance for a hearing to-morrow.

Nearly Washed away.

At noon yesterday Sam Rambert drove one of Spedel & Co.'s big delivery wagons, well loaded, into the edge of the water at the wharf. Inadvertently he drove too far and in turning the wagon and team both were nearly washed away. He managed to get them out, but with all his efforts could not save all the goods in the wagon. About 100 pounds of coffee was lost. Everything else was saved.

Marshal White Improving.

United States Marshal H. S. White, who came to the new hospital in this city last Saturday, is very much better. He has been suffering for three weeks past with malaria fever, and of his own choice came to this city because of the advantages offered at the City hospital for patients. Dr. McMaster is giving him careful attention. The marshal has elegant quarters and has the very best attention possible. Although quite ill, his condition is not at all dangerous.

Presidential Guesses.

Four men put up a pool of \$5 each at the McLure house yesterday, and drew lots for first pick of the presidential candidate to be nominated by the Republican convention. Blaine was taken by the first man, Harrison by the second, McKinley by the third, and Allison by the fourth. The same men made up a twenty dollar pool on the vice presidential nomination and selected names in this order: Rusk, Alger, Allison and Lincoln.

THE COUNTY BOARD

Transacts a Large Amount of Routine Business.

FINANCIAL REPORTS ACTED UPON.

The Per Diem paid for six Months. Report of the Supervisors of the Poor and other interesting Annual Reports Received and Filed—New Roads, etc.

All the members of the board of county commissioners were present at the regular monthly meeting yesterday. Bills aggregating \$232 06 were ordered paid on recommendation of the committee on finance, and it was resolved to borrow \$15,000 on P., W. & Ky. stock for the account of the new jail. Bills for \$151 33 were ordered paid on recommendation of the committee on court house and jail, and \$543 21 from the poor house and farm committee. There were seventy inmates in the infirmary in May. There were three births and two deaths in the institution, an unusual record.

Bills for \$1,202 58 were ordered paid on recommendation of the road and bridge committee. The arrangements for the repair of the Fulton and Elm Grove bridges made by this committee were approved.

The report of the clerk and the librarian were received and filed, also the annual report of the county physician. The county physician's report showed the number of persons receiving medical aid during the year, 122; visits made, 442; office consultations, 141; obstetrical aid, 1; lunacy examinations, 10; inquests, 4; deaths, 11. The contracts for the paraphernalia for the Australian ballot system were approved. An application from Justice W. H. Caldwell for a new docket was granted.

Ex-Policeman Tom Shanley was granted a license to keep a saloon at Elm Grove.

The county court of Brooke county having offered to open the West Liberty and Girty's point road in that county if this board would continue it in this county, that action was ordered taken.

It was resolved to meet June 24 to hear petitions for correction of erroneous assessments, select names of grand jurors, lay the annual levy and hear the selections of petit jurors made by the commissioners appointed by the circuit court.

The semi-annual per diem and other compensation of the commissioners were ordered paid.

Ike Smith put in an application for the Maier reward, but the board declined to do anything but ratify the action of the sheriff when he decides what to do.

A sewer was ordered to be put in from the new jail, the committee to consult with the city board of public works and make the best arrangement possible.

A communication was received from Geo. W. Woods agreeing to pay one-half of the cost of a breakwater on Woods' run, above the residence of J. F. Paul, Esq., as it would be of mutual benefit to him and the county. Referred to committee on roads and bridges.

The annual reports of the supervisors of the poor were filed. The following amounts were expended:

- Washington, \$1,196; Ritchie, \$996.50;
- Webster, \$938; Madison, \$155; Centre, \$928; Union, \$1,507; Triadelphia, \$243;
- Richland, \$153; Liberty, \$355.70.

The full board will go out to Fulton as a committee of the whole Wednesday at 9 a. m. to decide as to the advisability of allowing the Terminal company to construct the bridge and switch for which the right of way was asked.
