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all the book of our experience. Yet the free trade parrot shrieks, "The tariff is a tax," and the whole West Virginia delegation in a national Democratic convention sends back the answer, "A tariff that protects is unconstitutional."

Under the last tariff the Democratic party made this country did not establish potteries or any other industries. The sheriff's was about the only industry that flourished.

Stirred up a Hornet's Nest. The West Virginia Democratic politicians are hearing the horns buzz and fearing their sting. The flat-footed tariff plank of the Chicago platform is being so vigorously jumped on and the clouds are gathering so thick and fast that something must be done.

What do you suppose that something is? It would be a source of innocent merriment if it were not so sad. The esteemed Register has been put up to cast out that trouble-breeding, vote-losing tariff plank. Brother Taney, the accomplished general manager of the Register, joined his eloquent and powerful voice with the rest of the West Virginia delegation to vote that plank in against the report of the platform committee. Now, Brother Taney's powerful and eloquent Register repudiates the plank that was adopted and endeavors to restore the plank which he threw the whole of his great influence to cast out. Behold what the Register says:

The Democratic party does not want free trade. It is not only a political party, but a demand for political parties were to demand free trade—it could not be had in this country.

Here is the tariff plank which Brother Taney helped to knock out of the proposed platform. Note how closely it resembles Brother Taney's able editorial exposition of Democratic doctrine as he declined to accept that doctrine:

We reiterate the oft-repeated doctrine of the Democratic party, that the necessity of the government is the justification for taxation, and whenever a tax is unnecessary, it is unjust. It is not only a political party, but a demand for political parties were to demand free trade—it could not be had in this country.
