Some of the members of Council gathered on the public building steps yesterday evening, but soon saw there was no possibility of a meeting of Council being held. The Arion Sommerachtsfest lured away all but three of the members of the first branch, and the meeting was knocked out. Several committees were called to meet, but no quorums were obtained. The market committee has decided to view the market houses before getting bids.

## Transfers Recorded.

Clerk Hook yesterday admitted to record transfers of real estate as follows:

June 11, by Peter Boyd and wife, to John H. Jones, for \$1,000, the south thirty feet of lot 8 in square 2 in Water's addition, on South Broadway, Island.

## A Gratifying Increase.

In the past three years the annual revenues of the Wheeling postoffice have increased something over \$15,000. Under the laws and the regulations of the postoffice department the postmaster's salary in offices of the first class is fixed by the revenues. After the income reaches \$15,000, it requires an addition of \$15,000 before any addition is made to the salary. Wheeling in the past year reached the \$30,000 rank, and in accordance with the law Postmaster Cowden yesterday received official notice that his salary had been advanced to \$3,200.

## Reforming a School House.

The work of tearing off the old roof and nondescript cupola of the Fourth ward school, was begun yesterday. It is to be replaced so as to harmonize with the new annex built west of it. This is a very good move. If there ever was an inartistic, unattractive, mean looking top of a public building in Wheeling it was that one. Its lack of symmetry and grace was strongly emphasized by the building of the new house, which is a rather pretty structure.

## Another Prisoner Missing.

Recently "Luder" Hess was sent to the workhouse for 120 days. Luder is not there now. Last Saturday night he walked out. The fact has not yet been officially reported to the police, but Chief McNichol said yesterday that Superintendent Rodenbaugh told him about it. "They never report anything here," said one officer.

"They send prisoners down town on errands," said another, "and if a man doesn't come back that settles it."

"Rodenbaugh attends police court regularly to intercede for prisoners," another declared.

The fact is that the workhouse as now conducted is a farce, and if it cannot be reformed ought to be abolished.

## HERE IS GRETNA GREEN.

Wheeling Growing in Popularity as a Good Place

FOR PEOPLE TO COME AND MARRY.

Some Recent Instances of People who came to the City Single and Returned Home Mated—How Obstacles to the Issuing of Licenses may be Overcome.

Wheeling seems to be becoming popular as a resort for people from three states who want to be married. Yesterday Clerk Hook issued marriage licenses to Michael Sorg, aged twenty-five, and Caroline Bettler, aged twenty-one, both of Allegheny County, Pa., and to Albert E. Bland, aged twenty-four, and Elizabeth Schafer, aged fourteen, both of Tuscarawas County, Ohio.

The latter was a peculiar case. There were urgent, apparent reasons why the two should wed, and they had the parents' full consent, but under the Ohio laws a license cannot be issued to a girl under sixteen. West Virginia is more liberal, allowing girls to marry at twelve years of age, and for this reason the couple came here.

There is scarcely a week that some couple from beyond the confines of the county does not apply here for a license, and most of them get the same explanation for coming to Wheeling—they "just wanted to take the trip." The average case of this kind seems to be like that of the couple who were quietly married away from home, and the groom suggested to the bride that she should say nothing about it for awhile. "Oh, I sha'n't," said she; "I'm as much ashamed of it as you are."

In a majority of cases there is no reason for leaving home except that the people do not want to be married in the presence of their friends. A different kind of a case was encountered by Clerk Hook on Sunday, though. It was a genuine elopement.

A couple from Indiana called on Mr. Hook at his residence. They came in a hack, and the groom was in a very good humor. Mr. Hook asked how old the bride was, and was told that she was twenty.

"You are in the wrong state," said he. "The lady must be twenty-one here to get a license without her parents' consent."

The groom was at a loss what to do till Mr. Hook suggested that he get in the hack again and drive on out to St. Clairsville. In Ohio the bride is her own mistress at eighteen. This advice the couple took, and no doubt secured the papers they had come so many miles to get when they might as well have stopped just this side of the Indiana border.

There is something about the applicant for a marriage license which enables the experienced observer to know him when he enters the clerk's office. Even when, as is not infrequently the case, a stranger makes a mistake and goes to City Clerk Thoner, his mistake is usually apparent before he says a word.

"Do you issue the licenses here?" a stranger asked the city clerk.

"Yes, sir."

"Well, I want one."

Mr. Thoner took up his book of blanks and dipped his pen in the ink.

"What is the number?" he asked.

"Number? Why, this is the first."

"First what?"

"First time I have been married."

"Oh, you want a marriage license?"

"Of course," said the stranger, getting even redder than he was before.

"I thought you wanted to open a saloon." And he directed the applicant to the county's end of the big building.

After a stranger has his license he almost always hunts up a justice of the peace. Justices cannot marry people in West Virginia, but the squires are all used to this sort of visits, and being accommodating men, they send for a minister and allow the ceremony to be performed in the office.

A man twenty years of age, whose parents lived in Germany, applied for a license. There was no objection except the legal technicality which requires the parents' or guardian's consent if either party is under twenty-one. This was arranged. A friend of the bride was appointed guardian for the groom, gave bond as the law requires, formally granted his consent, and the license was issued. It is easy to get married in West Virginia if a person has a dollar and a half.
