

HILL IS A SULKER.

Playing the Role of Achilles in Spite of All Coaxing.

WHAT HIS INACTION MAY MEAN.

Cleveland Has Been Told by His Most Trusted Champions that He Must Win the Senator's Support; But Will not Break the Ice—Tammany Leaders Who Have no Favors to Hope for Will Knife the Ticket in New York.

New York, July 5.—All the Democratic politicians here and in Washington are waiting to hear what Senator David B. Hill will say regarding the nomination of Cleveland; and speculating on the effect his silence would have on the ticket.

The attitude of Senator Hill can, it is believed, be taken as the attitude of his followers. Whatever Hill does will also be done by those who recognize in him the leader of the party in this state.

When the news of the nomination of Cleveland was flashed over the wire to Washington Senator Hill, who had remained up all night reading the bulletins, is said to have turned away with a significant shrug of the shoulders, and a grunt of disgust.

But he did not forget the seventy-two Democrats of the New York state delegation, who had made the fight of their lives to defeat Cleveland. He sent a message to Chairman Edward Murphy, Jr., asking him to thank the New York delegates for their loyal support of his candidacy, and for their gallant fight to preserve the rights and dignity of the regular Democracy of the Empire State.

It was Senator Hill's opinion that Mr. Cleveland's champions in New York state were not regular Democrats, and those who profess to know say the senator is half inclined to ignore Cleveland on that ground.

All the friends of the ex-President are seeking to bring about harmonious relations between the candidate and his defeated opponent. They recognize the fact that the only hope the Democrats have of carrying the state lies in securing the assistance of the Democratic machine which is controlled by Hill.

They have made all sorts of promises and appealed to the name of Democracy. But Cleveland himself has been as silent as Hill. He wants Hill to turn in and help him in the campaign, but is not willing to "break the ice" and ask his old-time politician enemy to come to his assistance. It has been asserted that Cleveland would prefer to be elected without the electoral votes of New York. But the practical politicians who are in his confidence have given him to understand that the Mugwumps cannot be depended upon to carry Republican states for Democratic candidates, and have advised him to base all his calculations on the old-time doubtful states—New York, Indiana and Connecticut.

Tammany Hall and the Kings county Democracy are, on the surface, in line for Cleveland. The Tammany leaders have made public announcement that they would give the ticket their support. There are, however, in each of the twenty-four assembly districts, local leaders of influence who are pronounced anti-Cleveland. They are men who have little to expect under a Democratic Federal administration and who find the presidential ticket an acceptable thing for political trading.

The election of a Democratic assemblyman in a close district means more for actual politics to many of the district workers than the success of the presidential ticket. If Hill ignores the ticket or damns it with faint praise, there are any number of Democrats in New York who will take it as an excuse for trading Cleveland in the interest of local candidates.

A well informed Tammany man said yesterday that the organization would make a front for Cleveland, but would not undertake the careful canvass in the districts that means so much in votes on election day.

"Tammany Hall opposed the nomination of Cleveland in 1884," said the politician, "but swung into line and made a bluff at supporting him. The counties were strong then and gave him a loyal support. Election day came and Cleveland's majority in New York footed up 64 votes more than 43,000, or about 17,000 less than he ought to have received. In 1888, with Cleveland the unanimous nominee of the convention, with all that that implies, Cleveland with the machinery of his administration at his back, secured less than 56,000 majority in New York. This year he is the party candidate in the face of the stiffest opposition ever made against a New Yorker. All the leaders, from Long Island to Erie county, opposed him in the convention and begged that he be not nominated. What can he expect in votes? It was only his good showing in the interior counties in 1884 that made his election possible.

"He certainly is not so strong above Harlem bridge as he was then. He is not so strong in New York City as he was in 1884, for the counties cannot give him any organized aid, and Tammany Hall cannot control certain men who are against him and are bound to force it by cutting down his majority. I have a kindly feeling for Cleveland personally, but I cannot figure out how he can overcome the obstacles that are in his way in this state, and without New York his name is Denis."
