THE CONSENSUS OF OPINION

Is that a Great Blunder Was Made in Bringing in the Pinkerton Guards—Every Resource of the Law Should Have Been Exhausted Before Fanning the Flame by Introducing an Outside Armed Force—The Workmen Did Wrong in Taking Possession of the Property—The Law Should Be Respected by Both Sides.

New York, July 7.—The interest which was manifested in the wage trouble at the Homestead mills was intensified by the terrible rioting of yesterday.

The World says: It is too soon yet to apportion blame for what has occurred; too soon to predict what will occur hereafter.

In brief, there are legal ways and illegal ways of meeting force by force, and so long as organized society exists it is to the legal, and not to the illegal, methods that the citizen is bound to make his appeal.

The Tribune editorially says in part: The dispatches so flinty conflict that it cannot here be determined whether the first shot was fired by the watchmen attempting to land at the works or by the strikers.

The Times says: It is not necessary to discuss the dispute between the Carnegie Steel Company and its employees in order to fix the responsibility for the outbreak of violence at Homestead.

The Herald says: The outbreak was the result of lawlessness on both sides. It would have been averted had both or either kept within the bounds of the law.

FINANCE AND TRADE

The Features of the Money and Stock Markets.

New York, July 7.—Money on call easy at 2 1/2 per cent, last loan 2 1/4 per cent, closed offered at 2 1/2 per cent. Prime mercantile paper 6 1/2 per cent.

The stock market again subsided into the intense dullness which was so marked during last week, and with the cessation of the heavy bear pressure of the last few days a brighter tempo marked the dealings, accounted for material improvement in the quotations of the leading shares.

The Commercial Gazette says: "That the workmen were in the wrong in virtually taking possession of the mill property cannot be gainsaid, but the mill-owners were not justified in sending an irresponsible armed force to regain possession of it."

The Chronicle-Telegraph says: "It is peculiarly unfortunate that the troubles should occur at this time. Not on account of the possible effects upon the canvass of either of the presidential candidates, but for the reason that pending the election there is less chance of the question receiving the calm consideration which its importance demands."
