NEW MARTINSVILLE, W. VA., August 8.—Pursuant to a call made by the Republican county executive committee, the delegates of the several districts of the county met at Wileyville Saturday to nominate a county ticket.

The following ticket was nominated: For sheriff, George W. Thomas, an old veteran of Church district; for house of delegates, E. E. Stewart; for prosecuting attorney, J. W. McIntire; for surveyor, Ira M. Franklin; for assessor first assessment district, Robert M. Mayhall; second district, J. M. Ashcraft.
