## THE BIG LABOR DAY.

The Celebration in Wheeling To-day Will Eclipse them All

IT HAS GROWN BEYOND ALL HOPES

Of Its Most Sanguine Projectors—The Farmers' Alliance will take a Hand, and Pittsburgh will send down a big Delegation to swell the Contingent—Decorations more General than ever.

It is now evident that the annual celebration of Labor Day in Wheeling to-day, under the auspices of the Ohio Valley Trades and Labor Assembly, will eclipse all former similar occasions in Wheeling. Early yesterday the work of decorating houses was well under way. The Trades Assembly hall is fairly covered with tastefully arranged drapery and flags, while on that square and the next above several fronts are obscured with flags, bunting and designs. Portraits of eminent labor leaders are used at many places. The Hub window has a very tasteful and appropriate display, arranged by Harry Hanff, representing the dignity of labor. The Hub will also have a wagon with a clothing display in the parade this forenoon. Among the other trade displays will be one by B. Fisher's Star foundry. The committee decided to allow anybody to make a display in the procession, providing it was of union goods, and it is understood that a number of firms will do so.

Word has been received from Pittsburgh that a large delegation of workmen from Allegheny county will be down early this morning, and it is stated that the members of the Farmers' Alliance, 500 strong, will turn out from Ohio and Marshall counties.

The parade, made up as heretofore outlined in the INTELLIGENCER, will start from the Public Building corner at 10 o'clock sharp, and move over the route that has been printed. The picnic this afternoon bids fair to be one of the largest and most successful and enjoyable ever given on the State Fair grounds.

The Clarksburg carpenters' union and the Steubenville carpenters' union will both be here in good numbers, the latter headed by a brass band. There will also be a Pittsburgh band in line. There will be no lack of music on this occasion, that is sure.

The Quaker City brass band, which is to head the printers' contingent in the big parade to-day, arrived in the city yesterday evening.

The Powell-Rodewig-Maule sporting hose team, of Bellaire, that is to contest with the Martin's Ferry boys on the Island this afternoon, have made some changes in their team and are in excellent trim for the hub and hub race. The teams are well matched, and with no bickerings this ought to make an interesting race.


