TESTING THE ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

A Large Crowd and a Number of Horses on the State Fair Ground last Night.

Last night the electric light on the fair grounds was again turned on for a test, and proved a big success. The number of lights around the track has been increased from twelve to twenty, which makes the entire track and inclosure as bright as day, every part of the track being brilliantly lighted and plainly visible to spectators seated in any part of the grand stand. When the light was turned on in the former test, it was found that an insufficient number of lights caused sharp contrasting shadows, which caused the horses to shy and frighten. This trouble has been entirely overcome by the additional lights, which gives the track a smooth and well lighted appearance all the way around. A large number of local drivers were present last night with their flyers to take advantage of the novel opportunity presented, and the tracks made a very lively appearance between 7 and 8 o'clock, a number of impromptu races taking place. All were enthusiastic over the affair.

If it does not rain Monday, it is expected that there will be eight or ten thousand people present to enjoy the novel spectacle of the first electric light races ever held in this city. A number of exhibitors have started to place their exhibits in the main building and throughout the grounds, and the place presents a very lively appearance.

A FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT

In the B. & O. Yard at Bellaire Yesterday. A Woman Killed.

There was a frightful accident in the B. & O. yards at Bellaire yesterday morning, by which Mrs. John Reilly, mother-in-law of Marshal Charles Johnson, was killed. She was on a side track on which several cars were standing, when an engine at the other end of the switch shoved other cars in on the same siding, thus shoving those standing there farther back. Mrs. Reilly was so near them that she was thrown down beneath the wheels and her leg crushed to a pulp between the knee and thigh and her right arm crushed the same way, the wheels passing over both members, and the body was also terribly bruised. She died shortly after being picked up.

## A ROUSING MEETING

Of the Republicans of the Old Sixth Ward last Evening.

### CAPT. DOVENER MAKES A SPEECH

Which is Enthusiastically Received by an Audience which Packs the Hall—A Good Club Organized and Officers Elected—Col. Kemple also Entertains the Meeting Well.

Reibel's Hall, corner of Market and Twenty-third streets, was crowded to its utmost capacity last night by Webster district Republicans to organize a campaign club and listen to Captain B. B. Dovener and others discuss the issues of the day. The club starts off with about two hundred members, and judging from the earnestness and enthusiasm displayed last night will prove one of the most effective organizations in the county.

From its ranks will be formed a marching club, and a meeting will be held next Friday evening for that purpose. The club is composed principally of young, energetic, working Republicans, who are thoroughly alive to the importance of the campaign, and all will be found in line of battle from now until election day.

The following officers were elected last night: President, Thomas Davison; Vice President, Michael Grogan; Secretary, Charles Ebeling; Treasurer, William Linsky.

After the transaction of some other business in the way of permanent organization Captain Dovener was introduced. He was greeted with a storm of applause, which amounted to an ovation, and during the hour and a half that he spoke he was frequently interrupted by enthusiastic applause. The captain confined his remarks mainly to the great leading issue of the day, the tariff, and spoke with great effect. No speaker ever addressed a more appreciative audience or one more in sympathy with the truths that were uttered.

After Capt. Dovener, Col. Jake Kemple delivered one of his characteristic addresses, and kept up the enthusiasm to the last.

If one may judge from the character of last night's meeting, the Webster district Republicans will not be found wanting in November, and the newly organized club will not be found among the laggards.

A pleasant feature of the meeting was the stirring martial music by the Black Eagle drum corps. This musical organization may be expected to be a leading participant in most of the campaign events of the year.

THE CENTRAL CLUB ACCEPTS.

The Central District Republican Club held an interesting meeting last evening at their headquarters in the Lutz building, and blocked out a large amount of work for the campaign. The club also accepted the invitation of the Union District Republican Club to join in the social meeting of all clubs next Wednesday evening. This will be one of the features of the opening of the campaign, and all voters should attend and enjoy the occasion.


