COUNTY BUSINESS

Transacted Yesterday by the Commissioners.

ANNUAL RAILROAD ASSESSMENT

As Made by the State Board of Public Works Certified by the Auditor-An Unusual Amount of Routine Matters Attended to-The Cumberland Road and New Jail.

All the members of the board of county commissioners were present at yesterday's session. Four reports were read from the court house and jail committee, and all adopted. Routine matters concerning the new jail made up most of these. The contract for the stone wall along the driveway from Eoff street to the jail was let to Murray Brothers at \$4 per perch, and excavation at 25 cents per cubic yard. Bills aggregating \$668 were ordered paid. Morrison & Chew were employed to repair the heating boiler in the court house basement.

The finance committee's reports of August 5 and August 31 were approved. These showed \$1,000 due the county on the bond account at the Bank of Wheeling, and asked further time to secure information concerning the national road and to devise ways and means for its control and maintenance. Bills amounting to \$1,835 38 were ordered paid. The sheriff returned county orders to the amount of \$9,627 89, with which he was credited.

The chairman of the committee was authorized to borrow \$5,000 to pay current expenses until '92 taxes are paid, and that the president of the board sign a note for that amount; also that the superintendent of the national road contract for so much stone as can be paid for out of tolls after defraying current expenses.

Bills from the poor house and farm committee for \$943 35 were approved. The infirmary and inmates were reported in good condition. There were forty-seven inmates in August, and no births or deaths.

The road and bridge committee reported recommending that the chairman of the road and bridge committee be made superintendent of the masonry on the Cruger's lane bridge, at a compensation of \$3 per day. An offer by William Staabs to transfer his contract on this bridge to John J. Rea was rejected. Bills for \$1,011 12 were approved, and a number of minor road contracts filed.

A communication from the auditor certifying the railroad valuation in Ohio county for taxation was referred to the committee on finance. It shows the following assessment:

Several petitions for correction of erroneous assessments were properly referred.

A communication from Dr. Carter enclosing a bill for \$20 for examining lunatics was referred to the committee on finance.

The question of the best method of disposing of the old jail was referred to the same committee.

On motion of Mr. Vollinger it was resolved that no more money be paid on estimates for the new jail this month.

A petition for a watering trough near Frank Walter's was referred, and the board adjourned.


