

A BIG NEW INDUSTRY.

A Combination of Wheeling Jobbers in the Coffee Business.

GREAT THINGS MAY BE EXPECTED

Of an Enterprise with Such People back of it—A Modest Beginning may lead to Big Things in the Future—Success Assured from the Start—The Appliances already Purchased.

For a week or two there has been talk afloat of a great combine of Wheeling jobbers in the coffee business, but when any of those who were supposed to be interested were inquired of they were disposed to be reticent. Yesterday an official notice appeared in the INTELLIGENCER calling a meeting of the stockholders of the Wheeling Coffee and Spice Company. It was signed by Joseph Speidel, Myron Hubbard, James Cummins, James Neill and J. H. Devore, incorporators. It was learned by a reporter in the course of the day that much of the talk that had been heard was premature, but at the same time it was not very wide of the truth. The company so far consists of every jobber in the city with the exception of the S. Baer's Sons Grocery Company. This firm has already begun the erection of a big block, in which will be a coffee roasting establishment, and for this reason and others was not in a position to enter the combine.

Yesterday the last of the other jobbers who handle coffee joined the company. John C. Bartley, late of Baltimore, an experienced coffee man, with a national reputation, will be the superintendent. He is now in the east to buy improved coffee roasting machinery, which will be here in a few days.

The new company starts with a capital stock of \$29,000. At the start the building heretofore occupied by Joseph Speidel & Co. as a coffee roasting establishment will be used by the company, but it is safe to wager that with such backing as the company has it will be compelled in a short time to enlarge its facilities. The jobbers in Wheeling sell enough coffee in a year to make a considerable plant for that interest alone, and Wheeling may congratulate herself that they have "pooled their issues," and will hereafter operate as one big company.

SEE THAT YOU ARE LISTED.

Hundreds of Voters Are Not on the Assessors' Lists—The Law in the Matter.

The INTELLIGENCER again calls the attention of the voters to the important matter of registration. It is a singular fact that many intelligent persons cannot grasp the situation. You may be assessed for taxation yet not listed as a voter. Don't think because you have been an old voter that you are sure to be listed. See for yourself that your name is on the list. It will not only avoid you trouble at the polls, but you will then be sure that you can cast your ballot. The law on the subject reads as follows:

"It shall be the duty of each assessor in this state to list, as far as he can by due intelligence ascertain, the name of every qualified voter in each magisterial district of his assessment district, and to enter them in a separate list for each magisterial district, arranged in the alphabetical order of the names of the voters."

It has been discovered on examination of the assessors' books that hundreds of legal voters are not listed. As will be seen by an advertisement the assessors will be at the rooms of the Board of Commissioners from October 3 to 8 inclusive, from 10 to 12 a. m., 2 to 4 p. m., and 6:30 to 8 p. m., to register all voters who have not been listed, and also to make corrections in changes of residence resulting from moving from one district to another since the voter has been assessed. See to it that you are listed.
