Columbian Invitations.

Mr. D. G. Morgan and Mr. Christian Viewig, representing the Columbian invitation committee, visited some of the merchants yesterday and took orders for invitations, to be sent by them to their customers. In this way it is hoped to invite hundreds of people to be here on Columbian day who could not otherwise be reached. The merchants visited appreciated the importance of thus extending invitations to their customers, as orders for one thousand were taken in one square on Main street. Assessment Kicks.

People still have the bad taste to kick against the revaluation of property by the city. Yesterday two or three petitions were filed. One objected to a raise from \$200 to \$2,400, an increase of only 1,100 per cent. Most of this was credited to a house that was not built. Following are the petitions' substance:
Lawrence Heller, assessed in '91 for \$2,800 on a lot that cost \$2,500, and this year raised to \$3,500; unjust.
A. Allen Howell, raised from \$24,000 to \$42,500; another lot raised from \$4,600 to \$5,800; both out of proportion.
J. W. Glasscock, assessed in '91 at \$200, and raised in '92 to \$2,400; now assessed on a house and lot while there is no house on the lot.
John Breining, raised from \$1,400 to \$2,300, which he thinks is unjust.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The Business of Both Branches are Rushed Through.

A NUMBER OF LIQUOR LICENSES

Are Transferred—Reports of the Regular Committees—Just a Quorum Present in Each Branch—The Double Track Street Railway Ordinance in North Wheeling is Referred to Committees for Report on the Practicability of the Market Street Route.

It was nearly half past eight o'clock last evening when the second branch of Council obtained a quorum and proceeded to business, with President Jopson in the chair. On motion the reading of the minutes was temporarily suspended for the purpose of taking up liquor licenses. The following petitions were read: Charles E. Hill asked a rebate on his license to keep a coffee house at 1411 Market street, and that the same be applied to the license of Tyson & Livingstone, who applied for a license at the same place. This was granted, the bondmen of Tyson and Livingstone being Chas. Smith and F. Happy. The same action was taken in the matter of the license of George R. Ellsworth, at No. 30, Twenty-second street, transferring his license to Frank T. Bessie, under the same conditions with F. Happy and C. Smith as sureties. The license of Webb & Conard was transferred to Joseph Webb, under the conditions above named, with C. Smith and L. Haller as sureties. The minutes of the last meeting were then read and approved.

The police committee reported bills amounting to \$131 40, which were ordered paid. Forty dollars of this amount was for killing dogs.

The amount of bills reported and ordered paid by the Board of Public Works \$3,198 11. The health committee's bills aggregated \$383 42. The petition of John Wentzel, to keep a slaughter house at No. 43, Eighteenth street, was refused on the recommendation of the committee.

The Columbian committee reported that \$900 had been appropriated as the share of the city in the expenses of the celebration, and the amount was appropriated by a vote of 13 to 2.

The stone bridge commission reported that the actual cost of the structure was \$129,483 22. Bills amounting to \$388 77, recommended by the committee, were ordered paid.

The petition of the Wood Bros. Planning Mill Company was referred to the Board of Public Works.

Mr. Bailey's motion instructing the chief of police to enforce the ordinance in regard to licenses for public balls was adopted.

The resolution of Mr. Kenney in regard to relieving Fred Hartzell of water tax on account of injuries received while in the employ of the city, was referred to the water board with the request that it remit his taxes for water rent.

There being no further business before the second branch it adjourned.

In the first branch the most important subject for consideration was the new ordinance providing for a double track on Main street north of Tenth for the electric railway. This was offered by Messrs. W. A. Wilson, Captain Otto and Jacob Emsheimer. The matter was finally referred to the committees on streets, alleys and grades and railroads with instructions to see if it is not possible for the company to extend their track up Market street. The company claims that the grade on Market street renders its construction on that thoroughfare impracticable. Mr. Farrell presided with dignity in this branch in the absence of the mayor.
