A VOICE FROM THE SOUTH.

Letter from a Louisiana Republican Who Knows Whereof He Speaks—Democratic Outrages—The Force Bill and "Negro supremacy."

The following letter has been received by Col. C. L. Poorman, of Bellaire, from a well-known Louisianaian. For reasons that appear in the letter his name is withheld. The letter will be read with interest:

Hon. C. L. Poorman, Secretary of State, Columbus, Ohio.

DEAR SIR:—In my testimony as to the great worth of your little "giant" on the tariff, I flatter myself I am a judge of such economic issues, and for real clearness of exposition, stated in calm and forcible logic, it occupies the front rank, with no equals, and (as far as I am aware) no superiors. Descending from an unbroken line of Democratic ancestry, from the formation of that once great party; born under the blighting influences of conditions that existed in this state; reared amid the same influences, certain it is strange I ever broke from the moral and intellectual obliquity that has ever since held supreme mastery over the Democratic party.

To me it is amazing to read of their indignation aroused by a contemplation of the inequities of the "force bill." A stranger to their workings would suppose them to be descended from Heaven, totally incapable of wrong doing! While we know their infamy here and elsewhere, it brings to mind the idea of a harlot teaching a virgin chastity! The loyal people of the North, East and West, have been content to enter a protest against the frauds practiced here. They have been emboldened, and now have transferred their fraudulent actions to other fields. By this morning's papers I see there is an attempt made by them to steal the vote of Ohio through the colored vote. Can this be true? If so will a vigorous protest from the colored people here have any benefit in countering the move?

Should it be desired by your state committee, have them wire ex-Senator William Harper of this city, to that effect.

The condition of affairs here as gloomy as can well be imagined, and the prospects for the future fail to inspire the faintest hope. The most glaring frauds are practiced with an abandonment of semblance of decency, law and justice. And when we appeal to them derisive laughter is their most respectful reply to be looked for. We have men who are regarded in private life as examples for the youth to follow, and were you to approach them asking cooperation in a transaction having the slightest appearance of dishonor, the chances are ten to one you would be knocked down. But when it comes "to preserving 'white supremacy'" they have not the least hesitancy in stuffing a ballot box or forging returns! Men leading in all kinds of church work, to all intents and purposes devout followers of the meek and lowly Jesus; husbands of pure and devoted wives; fathers of lovely, sweet, beautiful daughters, moral upright sons, the hope of our country; never allowing a chance to escape to prate in the ears of the negro their superior intellect, and to remind these poor creatures that this is a "white man's government" is not conclusive, proceed to make it so, by diabolical deeds condemned by all people who have a vestige of humanity. These same psalm-singing scoundrels who have a mortal fear of "negro domination," see no wrong in cohabiting with colored women, raising negro children, who in after years must be shot down to preserve white supremacy!

My dear sir, the Republicans of the north do not know what courage is required to remain true to the faith in the south! If you had to endure the one-half of it the present administration would end the existence of the party.

I have been made to feel the effect of their displeasure, in every way possible, and were it known I had written this letter still more would I feel it.

Yet what I write is susceptible of incontrovertible proof.
