In the Circuit Court.

In the circuit court yesterday, in the case of William McGlumphy vs. Goodhue & Thomas, the petition for a writ of certiorari was refused and the proceedings dismissed. Judge Campbell will probably adjourn his court to-day.

Clerk Hook yesterday admitted to record a deed made January 30 by Catherine O'Donnell, widow, of Brooklyn, N. Y., to John Siab, for \$1,500, a lot fronting sixty feet on Lind street, in East Wheeling.

John Raob was appointed executor of the will of John F. Rikers, deceased; bond, \$300, with John F. Raob as surety.

In the Police Court.

The mayor yesterday fined Fred Artz, arraigned on complaint of his wife for loitering in a house of ill fame, \$10 and costs, which he paid. A warrant was then sworn out by Mrs. Artz for Stella Chester, for keeping a house of ill fame, but Stella was out of the city. One disorderly paid his fine, while another and a plain drunk went to the hill in default of the cash.

A Good Ordinance.

Chairman Dobbins, of the committee on ordinances, last night instructed a meeting to be called for Friday evening, next week, when several new ordinances will come up for consideration. Among them will be one to practically prohibit street faking, by placing a license of \$50 a day on the fakira. This, if passed upon favorably by Council, will stop the objectionable street faking.

In Jail for Ten Days.

Yesterday morning James Sweeney was an interested spectator in the police court. Officer Buch had in his pocket a warrant issued by Squire Rogers, charged by Ad Cares with "contending with loud and angry words to the disturbance of the peace," and he arrested Sweeney, who had a hearing before Squire Rogers, and was sent to jail for ten days in default of a fine of \$1 and costs.

Get your Money Saturday.

As announced a few days ago, City Clerk Thoner will not pay off the judges and clerks who served at the late city election until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Notwithstanding the announcement, the clerk's office is thronged nearly every day with the anxious creditors of the city. Yesterday and the day before about half of the hundred and sixty-five who served were around after their \$2 for services and fifty cents for two meals. The city will pay out \$478.50 on this account.

ONE OF THEM DIES.

William Kelly, a Riverside Explosion Victim, Died Yesterday.

William Kelly, the young man who was so badly burned at the Riverside turnace at Benwood, died yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. His death was directly due to concussion of the brain, caused by the report of the explosion near his head. Had his only injuries been his burns he might have recovered. The deceased had a host of sincere friends who mourn his untimely death. The funeral will take place Sunday from St. John's Catholic church.

SOUTH SIDE BLAZE

Called the Department Out Yesterday Afternoon.

An alarm from box 58 at the corner of Chapline and Twenty-seventh streets yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock called the department to a blaze in the frame dwelling house No. 2721 Chapline street. The entire department with the exception of the Island reel went to the scene of the fire.

The house is occupied by a family named Kennedy on the upper floor, while on the ground floor a family named Moore has been residing. The latter moved yesterday, but before closing up, set fire a lot of straw in the grate. This set fire to the chimney which communicated to the frame work in the garret, making a mean blaze to handle. Three lines of hose, including the Chemical, however, had it under control in a short time, but not until the building had been gutted with water inflicting considerable loss.
