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The Day We Celebrate. "St. Patrick's day in the morning," shouted the Register yesterday. No, this is St. Patrick's day in the morning. As the story goes, Ireland's patron saint was born at midnight on the 8th of March, but the old ladies of the neighborhood who assisted in the imposing ceremonies were divided in opinion as to the day, some of them insisting that it was the 5th, others holding out for the 9th.

What May Happen to Hawaii. According to information from Washington some remarkable thing may result from the visit of the President's commissioner to Hawaii. If Mr. Blount finds that there is a conspiracy back of the overthrow of the monarchy and the demand for annexation, our government would probably "command the restoration of the queen or the promotion of the princess, as the figureheads of the government, and give protection to this new regime."

The Great Question. The time and thoughtful attention of the new administration are of necessity given up for the present to one great question. It is not the Bering sea question, nor the Hawaiian question, nor the tariff question. It is the question of the distribution of the spoils, which the victors are eager to bear away. This is what is using up tons of papers and barrels of ink for the swiftly circulating petition whose doom, mayhap, is the all-devouring wastebasket. This is what is breaking up for a time so many of the family circles of the land.

Growing Up With the Country. The case of Roach, elected to the senate from North Dakota, illustrates the almost limitless possibilities of the boundless west. If, after robbing the Washington bank of which he was cashier, Roach had fled to one of the old states, he could never have got the grip necessary to make himself a United States senator. In the long settled, steady-going communities they do not take up so quickly with new-comers. They want to know about a man before they lift him above the average. In the new west it is quite different, probably because everybody is in a sense a new-comer. Nothing is settled, and while they are going through the

period of fermentation a shrewd fellow with a bad record may accomplish just what Roach has achieved in an equally short time. The people of North Dakota are not to blame for what they did not know, although it is strange that nobody told them about Roach. The Republicans in the Republican legislature could have saved their state and the senate the disgrace by electing a man of their own party. The responsibility is on them and they cannot shrink it.

The Country's Financial Strength. The action of the western banks in offering to the treasury gold in exchange for legal tenders has set eastern people to thinking, and they think some things which take from the old-time glory of Wall street. It is now admitted that the time has gone forever when Wall street could corner the money market by reason of its overshadowing eminence as the great money center. It remains the great money center of this country, but there are so many financial circles each with its own center than the comparative influence of Wall street has become as a tale that is told.

Assault on the Pie Brigade. The Birmingham, Alabama, Age-Herald is a Democrat. It remarks of the assault of the office-holders on the President: "No such pressure for the spoils of war has ever been dreamed of by the most ardent enemies of civil service reform." The pie brigade is overdoing the thing. Mr. Cleveland's original friends are discrediting themselves. But what will the pressure be when all of the original Cleveland men land there? More are on the way and some are trying to make arrangements to start for the seat of war. The highways and the byways are crowded with original Cleveland men, so that there is little room for anybody else. This is not the worst of it. There are not offices enough for the originals.

Baltimore & Ohio Pushing Ahead. The Baltimore & Ohio is progressing well with its scheme to absorb into its ownership the Ohio & Mississippi and the Southwestern properties, by which the great corporation will have its own direct line to St. Louis. Foreign holders of the securities having consented to the consolidation, it is believed that there will be no trouble in consummating the project. This is one of the railroad consolidations in which a distinct benefit to the public is apparent, and it will of course be a good thing for the Baltimore & Ohio, which is not letting many good things get away from it in these days. The management is showing a breadth and a strength of grip unexcelled by any of the great carrying companies.

Who's Afraid? It is sad to read in an increasing number of Democratic papers that "the burdens of taxation" cannot be diminished, that is to say, the McKinley act cannot be knocked out, because the treasury needs the revenue. Are great and immutable principles to be cast to the wind for a mere expediency? Isn't the vindictive tariff "a fraud" besides being unconstitutional?
