AN OHIO MAN DROWNED.

He Goes Out Seining and Falls Into the River and is Drowned.
On Monday evening Samuel Wiggerton, who lived with his wife and one child in Kirkwood, retired early, and at about 8 o'clock some friends called and invited him to go with them on a seining expedition in the Ohio river. He went with them, and this was the last seen of him except by the friends he accompanied. From the best information that could be obtained, it was learned that the party went to the river at a point just above the back river wooden bridge, and Wiggerton and a companion went out in a skiff with one end of the seine. The seine became fastened and, in trying to get it loose, the skiff was upset, throwing Wiggerton and his companion into the river. The man who was in the skiff with Wiggerton swam ashore, and he says the last he heard from Wiggerton was when he called out, asking, "Do you think you can make the shore?"

Wiggerton sank and his companions went home, and although it occurred about two o'clock Tuesday morning, they said nothing about it until the same morning at six o'clock. A force of men was at once put to work dragging and seining the river, but up to a late hour last evening they had not found the body.

For a year and a half Wiggerton had been a freight conductor on the C. & W. railway, but he quit his job about six months ago and has since worked with Bayha Brothers. He had while a conductor a life insurance of two thousand dollars, but had allowed it to become void. He leaves a wife and one child. He was twenty-four years old. All day yesterday, while the river was dragged, his old, heart-broken mother stood on the bridge, an anxious watcher.
