THE FUNNY JAIL BREAK

Still the Subject of Mirth at the Sheriff's Expense.

THE MORE THE AUTHORITIES TALK

The Deeper in the Hole they Get. Several Inaccuracies in the Statement Published Yesterday—Chairman Fritz, of the Court House and Jail Committee Makes a Statement.

Yesterday Jailer Weisgerber rushed into print in a statement intended to defend the recent ten days' monkey business while a number of men were known to be digging a hole in the wall with a view to escaping.

Yesterday County Commissioner Fritz, chairman of the committee on court house and jail, gave the INTELLIGENCER his statement of the affair, which shows that Mr. Weisgerber does not know why a peremptory stop was put to the digging at the wall on Monday.

Mr. Fritz said that on last Saturday he met Jailer Weisgerber in the Fifth ward market, and the latter said several of the prisoners needed clothes, were nearly naked. Mr. Fritz said the sheriff ought to present a list every month of what was needed, and not let the prisoners become nearly naked.

On Monday Mr. Fritz received a telephone message from Chief Deputy Otte, saying the sheriff desired to see him on very important business.

Mr. Fritz asked him why he did not stop it at once on finding it out, lock up the man who was engaged in it and keep him locked up, and give the other prisoners to understand that a similar punishment awaited anybody who might try in the future.

Mr. Franzheim responded that he wanted to find out who all were engaged in the plot, and he naively added, how much work was done each day!

Mr. Fritz told the sheriff that such a thing should be allowed to proceed only until discovered, and then those known to be in it should be promptly punished. He said the work must be allowed to go on no longer.

Franzheim told Chairman Fritz that he was lying at the peephole one-half day, with a revolver in his hand and a rifle beside him!

Mr. Fritz says when he was in the jail on Monday four or five prisoners were on the second cell corridor talking across to Jailer Weisgerber, who was in the guard room—a fine specimen of discipline.

In conclusion Mr. Fritz said: "I saw Mr. Voellinger's statement yesterday, and from personal knowledge I can vouch for every statement he made. If any person thinks the jail is not a good one, let him go in a cell and be locked in by a competent turnkey, and he will see how easy it is to get out."

During the talk with Mr. Fritz Mr. Voellinger was present, and he corroborated many of Mr. Fritz's statements from his own knowledge of the facts.

As to another point attempted to be made by Mr. Weisgerber, all recent prison construction provides for soil buckets. All other plans have been discarded by the best prison builders.

Yesterday afternoon, shortly after 2 o'clock, five of the prisoners charged with attempting to break from the county jail, were arraigned before Justice Arkle. They were remanded to jail in default of \$200 bond each, for the next sitting of the grand jury.


