

An unknown man, dead drunk, was locked up by Officer Minkemyer. Officer Trischler last night brought in Nick Pifer, on a charge of disorderly conduct at his home.

Eleven Cases Yesterday.
In the police court yesterday Tisha Bowman was arraigned for keeping a house of ill fame, with a girl named as Elie Campbell, and Charles Bolden, both found in the house. All are colored. The cases were postponed till this morning. There were eight other cases, but the revenues aggregated only \$17 40. Sam Hurtle's case for abusing his wife was also postponed. Lizzie Harden, for fighting, went to jail, and Puff Riley, Jerry Day and John Weiss to the hill, in default of their fines.

East End Runaway.
Yesterday one of the Singer sewing machine wagons in charge of an employe, H. E. Bown, was wrecked in the East End. The horse attached to the wagon became frightened at something and started at a two minute gait up the street. The outfit soon came to grief, the wagon striking an obstruction, causing the breakage of the shafts and one wheel. Neither the horse nor Mr. Bown were hurt.

Funeral of Joseph M. Hamilton.
The funeral of Joseph M. Hamilton, formerly of this city, who died at his home in Brilliant on Tuesday, took place yesterday afternoon at half past two o'clock from the Terminal station, the interment being at Greenwood. The obsequies were under the auspices of Nelson lodge, A. F. & A. M., of which the deceased was a past master. His death caused sincere mourning in a wide circle of friends.

The Bodies Removed.
On the site of the upper Riverside steel plant in Bonwood, there has been for years an old family burying ground, where seven bodies are interred. There have not of course since the erection of the plant been any more burials there, but the ground is now needed by the Riverside, so that it was deemed advisable to have the bodies exhumed and interred elsewhere. Peter J. Altmeyer, the south side undertaker, was yesterday engaged in this work, and the bodies were buried again in Greenwood cemetery. The name of the family that was buried there is Mason.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

A Workman Falls Through a Sky Light, Breaking Three Ribs.

Yesterday afternoon about two o'clock there was quite a serious accident on the lower South Side, Charles Border, a workman employed in the construction of Mrs. Archibald's residence on Forty-fourth street, was working on the roof at the time named when he in some way slipped from his position and fell through the sky-light to the ground floor, a distance of fifteen or eighteen feet. He was fearfully shaken up and three ribs were fractured. Fellow workmen placed the injured man in as comfortable a position as possible, and Dr. Ford was summoned. The latter made an examination, and soon after he was taken to his home in the Sixth ward.

THE ELECTRIC CARS

Will Now Be Run With Power From the Forty-second Street Station.

An improvement in the power which operates the electric street car line can be looked for this morning. The old South Side power station for some time has not been giving satisfactory power, so that the announcement of Mechanical Engineer Wright that commencing this morning, the new power station at the foot of Forty-second street will furnish power for the entire line, will be favorably received. The new station has for some time been furnishing power for the Island-Martin's Ferry line, and it has been entirely satisfactory, much better than on any other part of the road.

Two engines and four generators will be required to furnish power for the entire road, leaving in reserve one engine and two generators.

AN INTERESTING RACE.

E. C. McClelland will Run Ten Miles against a Trotting Horse.

E. C. McClelland, the famous champion long distance foot racer, recently challenged Herman Hess for a race against Hess's trotting horse, for \$250 a side, McClelland to run ten miles while the horse trots the same distance, and every time he breaks, must be pulled down to a trot again immediately. The parties were to meet last night to make final arrangements, but Hess was unwell, and sent word he could not come. They will meet Saturday evening at 8 o'clock to sign the articles of agreement and put up the money.

Dewey, of Wheelings, recently presented the Cadiz public library with two hundred and fifty volumes of choice books, and an elegant case in which to place them. Only about one-half of the force at Hobbs' glass house, on the south side, was at work yesterday. This state of affairs was caused by a number of the boys quitting on account of the intense heat, which necessarily threw off a number of men. The boys go back to work this morning.
