

THE POTTERY BURNED

Up at Tiltonville at an Early Hour on Sunday Morning.

VERY SEVERE BLOW TO ITS OWNER.

The Origin of the Flames Unknown. The Loss about \$40,000, with Only \$12,000 Insurance—It was Manufacturing Sanitary White Ware and had Just begun to be Prosperous.

News was received in Wheeling yesterday that the Western sanitary pottery, operated by John Rowe, at Tiltonville, up the river, had burned to the ground.

Inquiry developed that the flames were first noticed between four and five o'clock yesterday morning, and they had already gained such headway that although the citizens of the village worked heroically, absolutely nothing could be done to save the burning buildings, which were mainly of wood.

The flames broke out first, apparently, in the glass kiln shed. A very dense smoke was caused by the straw and other packing material stored in it, and this served also to add to the inflammability of the structure.

NOTES ON NAVIGATION.

Stage of Water and Movements of Boats. The River Interests.

The Annie Laurie passed down yesterday morning at 2 o'clock for Zanesville with a good trip.

The big Joe Williams and her million-bushel coal tow passed Vicksburg, Miss., yesterday morning. She will reach New Orleans to-morrow.

The speedy Scotia will be here from Cincinnati at 8 a. m. to-day, and leave for Pittsburgh and way points soon after. She has a good trip from below, and will add some here.

The Iron Queen has on her present trip three Pittsburgh bank presidents, Robert Arthurs, of the Fifth National, Robert Wilson, of the Citizens, and Leet Wilson, of the Fort Pitt.

The Ben Hur will leave for Parkersburg this evening. Her sister boat, the Courier, will be here this evening from Marietta where she has been undergoing repairs, and will resume Tuesday, leaving here for Parkersburg at 11:30 a. m.

There were four departures for Pittsburgh yesterday, including the H. K. Bedford at 4 a. m.; Lizzie Bay from the Kanawha, 7 a. m.; Ben Hur from Parkersburg at 7 a. m.; Keystone State at 11 a. m. with a big trip including a number of excursionists from below.

The stage of water at the wharf last evening was 9 feet 9 inches and still falling. No more coal will come out from Pittsburgh until a rise arrives, which is expected at any time. There is still pretty good water for the packets, but three or four more feet of a fall will send some of the larger boats to the bank.

A communication has been received from Lieutenant-Commander F. W. Crocker, light house inspector Fourteenth district, giving notice to masters and pilots of changes in lights between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati. The light at Smith's Landing has been moved up about twenty-five yards. The light at the head of Brothers was moved down about one hundred yards to the head of willows.
