Lopping Off Pensions.

The secretary of the interior, on the strength of an opinion by the attorney general, revokes a previous order by which pensions have been granted for disabilities received after the expiration of the applicant's service and without regard to his ability to earn his living by manual labor.

It is now held that the law requires this discrimination between disabilities received in the service and those received after the expiration of the term of service. It is for executive officers to respect the law as they find it, and if this ruling be in accord with the law it is entitled to respect as an exposition of the law.

The action of the interior department will bring up the subject for discussion, and the country will have both sides of the question strongly presented, if there be two sides. Pension laws as well as other laws should be faithfully administered.

It is believed that the change of practice will save the treasury from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 a year; which is worth saying if it be honestly saved and not dishonestly taken from man entitled to it under the law.

JOHN BOYD THATCHER is getting such a turning over as might make him President if he were a bigger man. His system of fair awards has caught almost everybody—the wrong way.

He Will Go It Alone.

Somebody "close to" the President has been reading his mind. In his next message to Congress he will flash on the country some startling reform propositions. The tariff will be his bright particular star of reform, and it will not be anything borrowed from the Democratic platform.

Certainly. Why should the President pay any regard to the platform of his party? Isn't he bigger than his party and a good deal better? If he is determined to have a fourth nomination the thing to do is to make his party as small a factor as possible, so that it may be handled easily and turned to the account of whom it may concern.

A very clever thought would be to dispense with the party convention and grandly declare himself in the field, his own nominee, as it were, for the presidency. The freshness of the move would be captivating.

Barrier steamship companies are booking large lists of passengers for the big fair. It will be pleasant to get back some pounds sterling in exchange for the American dollars we have been sending over there.

An Anti-Jail Breaking Device.

An ingenious person has an idea for prison cells which might be put in practice in our jail to prevent any more ten day jobs of jail breaking. He would build the cells of steel or iron pipe to hold water under high pressure. Any puncture of a pipe would let the water out, at once reduce the pressure and give the alarm.

A simpler way to keep prisoners in would be to convince them that it is not safe for them to be at large. The Wheeling plan allows prisoners to work on the jail for ten days under peep-hole surveillance, but this has not the endorsement of the best authorities.

A New Arm for Our Soldiers.

The failure of American inventors to equal the best magazine rifle of foreign devising is very disappointing. They had the opportunity and the government did what it could to stimulate their best efforts, and they have not come up to the requirements.

The army board of ordinance and fortification selects the Danish Krag-Jorgensen rifle as the best in existence. The model presented in the competition is an improvement on the rifle of the same make adopted by Denmark and Norway. It weighs nine pounds and eight ounces, and is of thirty caliber. The magazine holds five cartridges. A knife bayonet is attached to the piece.

As soon as the finding of the board is approved the production of 400,000 of these arms will begin under the act

Congress. The work will be done in this country, the patentee receiving a royalty.

A FOREIGN commissioner to the fair has gone crazy. There is so much to see and one man has but one life.

The Fair Through Foreign Spectacles.

Our foreign friends are out too soon with their prophecy of the failure of the fair. There may be stringency in the finances of the management, but the exposition as an exposition is already the greatest success the world has seen.

The attendance has not come up to expectation, but the weather has been very unfavorable, and this would have kept visitors away even though everything had been in perfect order and railroad fares had been cut in half.

Our foreign critics err again when they think the success of the fair depends on visitors from abroad. We shall be glad to see foreigners come as thick and fast as they please; but there is not transportation enough to bring over in six months as many as can get to Chicago by rail in two days.

In point of attendance the fair will be a success or a failure according to the number of home folk who visit it.

FROM some partisan comments it seems that ex-Secretary Foster would not have failed if he had not been a Republican. This may be true. It is at least a mighty thought.

Narrow Between the Eyes.

Rev. Dr. Holafeld, of New Jersey, should be renamed Hollowhead. His speech in the general assembly abusing the Protestant Episcopal church shows him to be very narrow between the eyes.

There has not been understood to be a fight between that church and the Presbyterian church. Presbyterians and Episcopalians get along comfortably as good friends, and any preacher who does not like to see things go this way would do well to hold his peace.

World's Fair Expenses.

To meet the running expenses of the World's Fair it is necessary to have every day fifty cents a piece from 90,000 persons. The average daily attendance, not including the first open Sunday, has been 38,000, considerably less than the necessary number of paying persons. Much larger attendance is expected. It takes money to conduct an enterprise of this magnitude.

One of his subjects now in Chicago comes to the defense of the sultan of Johore, who has been attacked by a writer in sundry American newspapers. As we understand the defense the sultan of Johore is a gentleman, a scholar and a good judge of the things that delight him. SUNDAY AT THE FAIR.

A Strong Point.

Chicago should keep the money, but repudiate the condition, we do not see how the condition could be enforced. If she should return the money, her right to open or shut the gates at will, subject only to the laws of Illinois, would be undisputable. The point has been raised that the law with the Sunday closing provision is unconstitutional, inasmuch as it amounts to the appropriation of money to hire citizens of the United States to refrain from doing what the government of the United States has no power to prohibit them from doing; and a very strong point it is.

Early Decision Desirable.

The importance of obtaining an early decision on the question is self-evident. The question is whether congress has the right to do in a roundabout way what it has no power to do directly. This, however, is a matter apart from the moral right of the fair management to accept an appropriation on a certain condition, and then disregard the condition while holding fast to the money.

The Money Needed.

The exhibition is on such a stupendous scale that it will require every possible source of revenue only to keep it going, and to cut off the receipts not only of one day out of seven, but of the one day when the largest number of persons have leisure to attend, is to make financial failure certain.

A Good Effect.

There will be a great shrinkage Sunday in the profits of the fair whose place of "business" is outside the gates of the World's Fair. The people will pass them by and spend the day pleasantly, happily and innocently viewing the wonders of the great exposition.

Should Be Considerate.

Would it not be well for ministers who are zealous on Sunday closing to consider the point that possibly they may be in error on the matter, and not adopt a view which holds that all Christians favoring Sunday opening should be classed as heretics?

Would Be a Good Thing.

There is no harm in holding religious services within the World's Fair enclosure on Sunday if proper arrangements can be made to that end. A good preacher would no doubt draw quite well.

Burns Brothers have a band saw mill in Elizabeth which now has a record of cutting more lumber in a day than any mill in the United States.
