

He had been hopelessly ill for two weeks, and confined to the house for over two months. He was a member of the city police force under Chief Dalbruggo, and afterward under Capt. McNichol, and resigned on account of failing health. He leaves a large circle of friends, who sincerely sympathize with his bereaved family.

A member of the finance committee said last night that he would not be willing to go on a guarantee paper, unless at least one hundred boxes are placed. There is no disguising the fact that it will take hustling and an exhibition of nerve on the part of a number of persons in order to secure Pompeii.

THE CITY WATER BOARD.

THAT PEWIKY WALL.

The Rivermen Will Fight It in the Courts if Necessary.

MAJOR STICKNEY MAY INTERFERE

As the Proposed Wall Will It is Said Encroach on the Harbor Lines—If Council Grants the Franchise an Injunction Will be Secured—The City Cannot Dispose of the Wharf for Other Purposes.

Should the city council grant permission to the Pittsburgh, Wheeling & Kentucky railroad company to use a slice of the city wharf for the purpose of laying additional tracks at their station at the foot of Eleventh street, trouble will surely arise. It is learned that the river men who make the claim that the proposed wall which the Pewiky wants to build, will form an obstruction to the free navigation of the river, intend in the event of council granting the permission or franchise, to secure an injunction and thus take the matter into the courts, where they are certain the matter will be decided against any encroachment onto the wharf. Their principal ground for this certainty is that the river front was originally granted to the city for wharf purposes, and those alone, precluding its use for any other purposes.

In addition to these grounds, the river men say that the city cannot and does not have authority superior to that of the United States, and that if the proposed wall was built, it would come under the provisions of the law establishing harbor lines here, to establish which Major Amos Stickney and a commission were in Wheeling recently. The river people have communicated with Major Stickney, whose headquarters are at Cincinnati, and an answer by telegraph is expected this morning, which it is thought will have considerable effect on the future action of the council committee on wharves and on council itself.

The prospects are that a long and bitter fight will result.
