Columbian Fourth Committee. The Columbian Fourth of July celebration committee on music has been called to meet this evening at 8 o'clock at the office of Superintendent W. H. Anderson, who is the chairman of the committee. At this meeting the musical programme for the Fourth will assume definite shape.

It was not a Fire. The impression prevailed about town last evening that a fire was raging in the north end or beyond there. The sky was illuminated as if by a big blaze. It was not a fire, however, but the light from the Top mill blast furnace, which was being "blown out" or cleaned, in order to tear it down, preparatory to building a new one. All the cinders, dust and ashes are blown from the top of the cupola by the air blast.

Appointed Immigrant Inspector. Mr. Roman Dobler yesterday afternoon received a telegram from United States Senator Faulkner, at Washington, congratulating him on his appointment as an immigrant inspector, at a salary of \$1,500 a year and traveling expenses. This was the first intimation he had of the success of his application. He had many indorsements by prominent men which he had not yet filed, and his appointment was largely due to the recommendation of the trades assembly and various local unions.

At Clerk Hook's Office. George Wise yesterday qualified as executor of the will of Jacob Wise, deceased, and gave bond in \$100,000, without surety, no surety being required by the terms of the decedent's will.

Frank B. Klieves qualified as administrator of the estate of Hannah Caroline Kenamond, deceased, giving bond in \$5,000, with Bernard Klieves as surety.

A marriage license was issued to George H. Kindleberger, aged twenty, and Lydia Tuttle, aged nineteen, both of Wheeling.

For Criminal Assault. Thomas Star, who has been working at Portland, attempted to commit a criminal assault on Miss Pearl Oliver, a fourteen-year-old daughter of James Oliver, a prominent farmer, on Wednesday evening. He met her on the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad, two miles west of Portland, and her screams attracted the attention of Tib Fulton and Robert McCleary, who pursued the villain and caught him, but not until two or three shots had been fired at him. He was taken to Warrenton and given a preliminary hearing before Squire Neely. He plead guilty and was lodged in the county jail at Steubenville. The affair created considerable excitement.

Ulrich-Zimmer Marriage. Yesterday at noon at the residence of the bride's father, on the South Side, Mr. Albert F. Ulrich, the popular and clever young manager of H. F. Bohrens' Market street establishment, was quietly married to Miss Mollie Zimmer, who for some time has been one of the efficient teachers at Webster school. Rev. Mr. Uffert officiated. After the ceremony had been completed a repast was partaken of and the newly married couple left on a tour for Chicago.
