Officer Desmond yesterday lodged Thomas James in jail. He was on the verge of the jimjams, and Squire Gillespy gave him ten days to sober up.

A Brewing Company Chartered.

The certificate of incorporation of the Smith Brewing Co. was yesterday filed with Clerk Hook. The capital stock is limited to \$100,000, and the incorporators are M. E. Lally, A. E. Smith, W. H. Ramp, William Maser and A. V. McDonnell, holding one share of \$100 each. Their purpose is to operate the old Smith ale brewery, on Market street. A power of attorney from the company to F. P. McNell was also filed.

South Street Tabernacle.

Work is being pushed day and night by a force of a dozen or more men to get the memorial tabernacle on South street ready for the formal opening next Sunday. A distinguished revivalist from New York will be here on that occasion, and he will probably bring with him the gentleman who will take charge of the church. All is completed ready to open except screwing the seats on the opera chairs, which is a pretty tedious job, as there are 713 of them. The interior is very handsome.

It is suspected that the shrewd game written up in yesterday's INTELLIGENCER exclusively has been worked twice in this vicinity. In the past day or two over a hundred letters have been received at the Elm Grove postoffice addressed to a woman. So far they have not been called for, and as no person of the name gets mail there, it is suspected that this is another case of swindle. Postmaster Cowden yesterday sent all the letters addressed to the "salix" advertiser here, and which had any clue to the sender, back, with a copy of the INTELLIGENCER exposing the fraud.

A Very Nasty Case.

Young Meyers, accused by his adopted sister, aged eleven, of a nameless and shocking crime, was given a preliminary hearing by Squire Gillespy in the jail office yesterday afternoon. M. D. Post conducted the examination for the state and S. O. Bovee appeared for the defense. The girl gave her testimony in a very straightforward manner, and all the cross examination did not shake it. The most repulsive feature was made public yesterday, when physicians testified that the accused and his victim were both suffering with a loathsome disease. The testimony was not nearly finished at 6 o'clock, and the case was adjourned till 9 a. m. to-day.

MYERS IS HELD.

The W. & L. E. Freight Agent at Martin's Ferry Gives Bond.

Charley C. Myers, freight agent of the Wheeling & Lake Erie Railroad Company at Martin's Ferry, who was arrested last week charged with the embezzlement of \$300, was yesterday given a preliminary examination and held in the sum of \$500 to await the action of the grand jury.

(George Duncan appeared for the railroad company and J. C. Gray for the defendant.)
At first the attorneys had a tilt over the affidavit. This was settled and Judge Gray then demanded that the company give particulars as to what testimony they would use. Mr. Duncan thought this unnecessary. Mr. Gray insisted and the plaintiff finally consented, Duncan saying that they would make several affidavits, covering several items of shortage.

The first was one charging Myers with embezzling \$61.84, collected from Smith, Hall & Co. on or about April 4, 1892. To this Myers pleaded not guilty and this particular one was tried.

Mr. Brown, the W. & L. E. auditor; John Smith, of Smith, Hall & Co., and George H. Smith, cashier of the Commercial bank, were put on the stand.

Brown testified that the money had been collected and never turned in. Brown testified that he followed up Myers to June 13 when he found him \$700 short and went back to the office and found that the shortage, instead of being \$700, was in reality \$976.18. He testified to having gone over the account three different times, to his conversation with Myers with reference to the shortage, and that Myers said to him that he did not suppose that it would be worth while for him to ask the company to allow him to work it out.

Mr. Myers did not go on the stand and Gray made a motion to dismiss the case.

Squire Keller said it would be necessary to hold Myers. After the attorneys said considerable about the amount of bond it was fixed at \$500.

RAN AWAY FROM HOME.

Mary Klieves, Aged 16, Ships to Join Her Lover.

Chief of Police McNichol was notified yesterday morning by Mrs. John Klieves, of Water street, that her sixteen-year-old daughter, Mary, had run away from home, and it was believed she had gone to Pittsburgh to meet Philip Dwyer, a young man whose father keeps the Point View house, at Pittsburgh. The chief telegraphed to the Pittsburgh authorities to watch the Lundy house there, where it was supposed the couple would go. In the afternoon, however, a Martin's Ferry girl who was very intimate with the Klieves girl told her mother that she was to meet young Dwyer at McDonald, and a message was telegraphed there also, while the Pittsburgh authorities were communicated with by telephone and asked to ascertain where the girl left the train. As she left home on Tuesday afternoon, it might be expected to be pretty hard to locate her twenty-four hours afterward. Mrs. Klieves was very anxious to have her brought back.
