### HELD FOR HOBBERY.

Three Young Men Sent to Jail by Squire Gillespy.

At an early hour yesterday morning John Donavin, who lives over at West Wheeling, was in the Sixth ward, and he wanted to go home, but the ferry had stopped. Two young men offered to take him over in a skiff, and they, with a third man, started for the river. When they came to a secluded spot one of the three caught Donavin by the throat and stuffed an old black hat into his mouth, while the other two held his hands and went through his pockets, taking all the money he had, \$5 or \$6, and a pocket knife.

Donavin informed the police yesterday morning, and Officer Driller suspected Bandy Johnson, Teddy Flinn and Dode Medley. They were arrested, and in the pocket of one was found the slouch hat, in another's the pocket knife and in all a little money like that stolen from Donavin.

Yesterday afternoon Squire Gillespy gave the three men a hearing at the office of the chief of police, and held each in \$1,000 bail for the criminal court, a grand jury session of which opens to-day. In default of bond they were all remanded to jail.
