

### Party in the Country.

At Mr. Frank Hearne's handsome place at Leatherwood yesterday a Fourth of July fete was given, and Mr. and Mrs. Hearne entertained many of the young society people of the city in a most charming manner. The festivities continued well into the evening.

### For Assaulting His Wife.

Generally speaking, the conduct at the picnic on the state fair grounds yesterday was excellent, but of course with such a crowd it was not entirely like a Sunday school. Bob Woods struck his wife at the picnic and Officer Lukins arrested him and hauled him over to town in the wagon. This was the only arrest.

### The Big Wheel Popular.

Many people have found out that Wheeling has a miniature of the famous big Ferris wheel at the World's Fair. This is the upright "merry-go-round" put up by Mr. William McLaughlin on the State Fair grounds. It was run yesterday by Capt. W. H. Davis, and about 7,000 people were whirled through the air in it at the Boothoven picnic.

### Embarrassing All 'Round.

Yesterday evening Officer Ritz arrested Maggie Wells, a well known colored woman, who has often been up on the same charge, plain drunk. She was nearly helpless, and was taken to the chemical engine house to wait for the patrol wagon. There she proceeded to disrobe, and did so entirely in spite of all efforts to prevent her. She had to be wrapped in blankets to be hauled to the lockup, where for some time she refused to reclothe herself.

### Fined for \$38.000.

Intelligence was received in the city yesterday that Ex-Sheriff J. L. Curtiss, of Wellsburg, one of the proprietors of the Pan Handle News, had made an assignment, with liabilities of about \$38,000 and assets of nearly \$20,000 or perhaps a little more. No reason is assigned. The assignment was made several days ago, but was kept quiet. Most of his liabilities are to Brooke county, and that part, of course, his bondsmen are held for if his assets do not meet it, which is scarcely probable.

### Two Camed at Once.

Night before last Messrs. H. E. Waddell and Smith Butler, who have severed their connection as officials with the Hobbs Glass works, were presented by the workmen with elegant canoes. James Minkemeyer made an opening speech, after which Mr. Waddell surprised Mr. Butler by presenting him the canoe with a highly complimentary speech. Butler was much affected by the unsuspected turn of affairs, as he had been summoned to present a canoe to Mr. Waddell. He managed to express his gratitude, and then Mr. Minkemeyer made the other presentation speech, to which Mr. Waddell very gracefully responded.

### In Police Circles.

The fakir and his woman arrested by Officers Carney and Lukins night before last were both fined by the mayor yesterday. Their joint fines amounted to \$30, which they paid. Two men arraigned for fighting were dismissed on account of the holiday season.

Yesterday an old man from the poor house was locked up pretty drunk. He will be sent back home. A countryman was also run in as a plain drunk.

Officer Rohrie is able to be out again after a spell of illness. Harry Jones was arrested by Watson for disorderly behavior, and John Blockard by O'Brien on the same charge. The same officer later ran in Thomas Matthews, Sam Dawson and Tom Norton for disorder in the Sixth ward.

### PRECOCIOUS EXCURSIONISTS

Come to Wheeling on a Freight to See the Big Celebration.

Yesterday two boys, who said their names were Rankin and Perkins and that they came from Washington, Pa., to see the celebration, called at the city building. The officers found they had eaten nothing and got dinner for them. Later Duncan Rankin, chief of police of Washington, telephoned that his boy, Milton, and Harry Perkins had run away from home at 2 o'clock yesterday morning and come here on a freight train. Lieut. Terrill went out and looked up the lads and brought them in and they were sent home last evening. They were entirely willing to go, saying they had seen enough, and the Rankin boy was curious to know what it had cost to telephone back and forth, and then began to figure how much more it would have cost to pay the regular fare on passenger trains. He is 12 years old and the Perkins boy 13.
